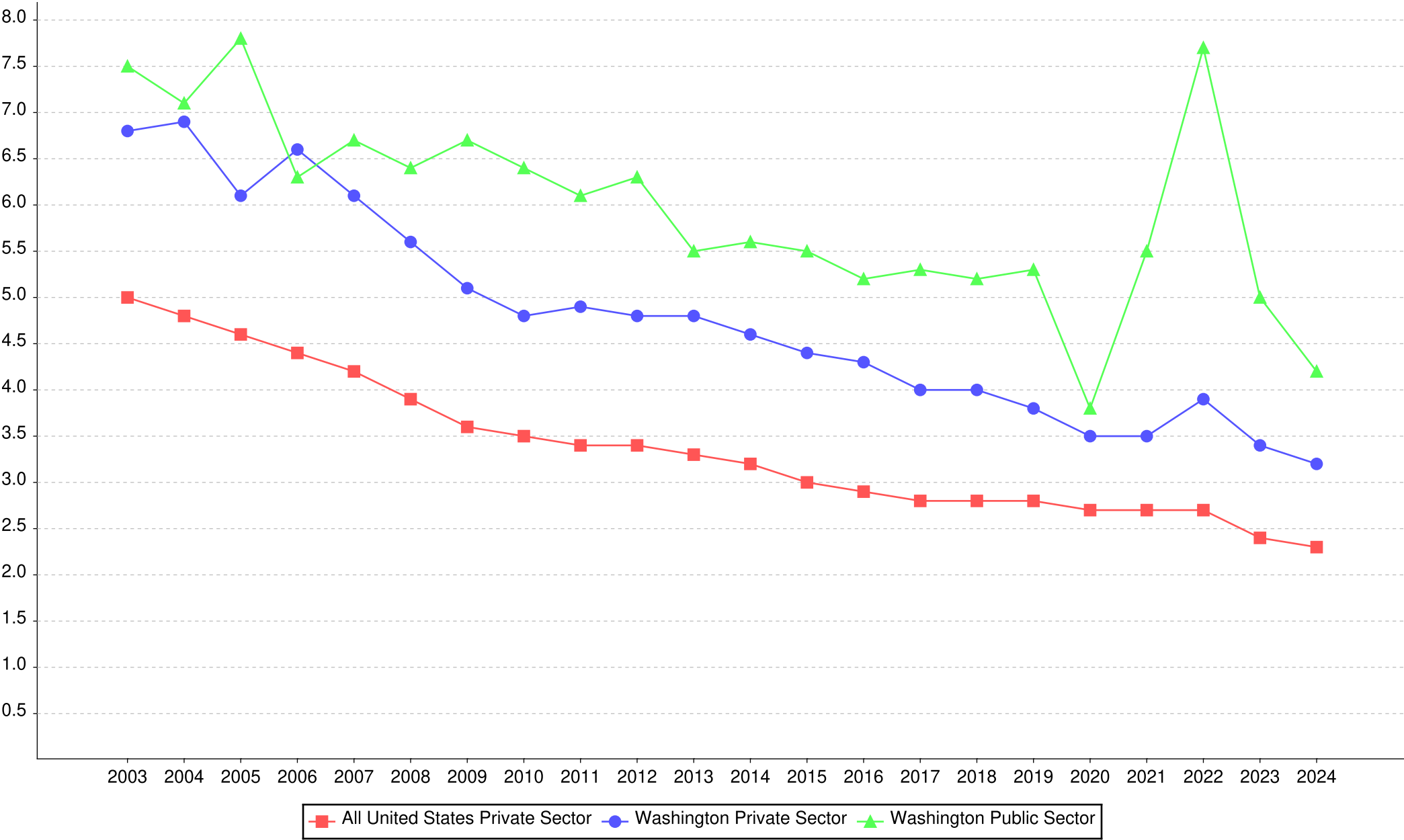

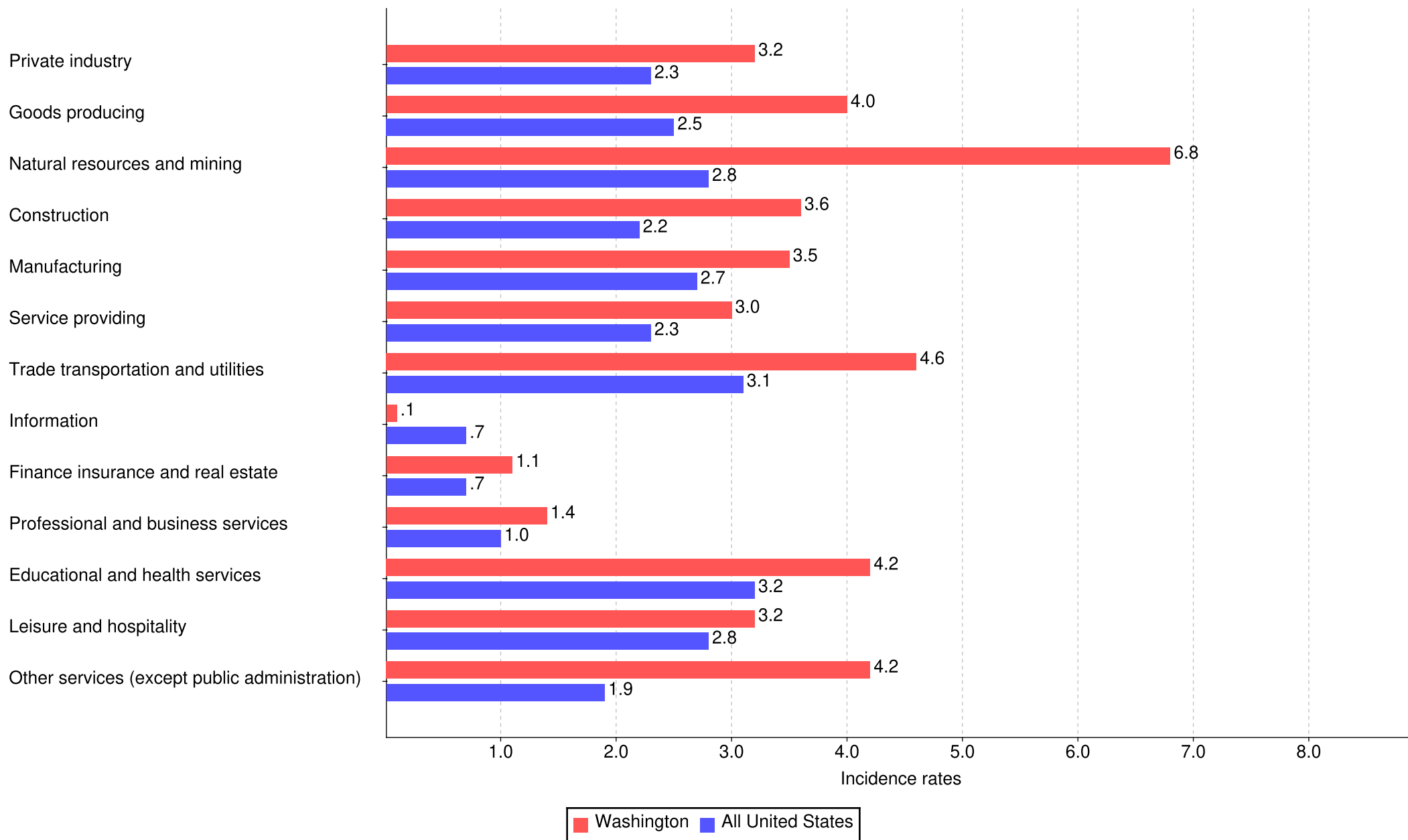

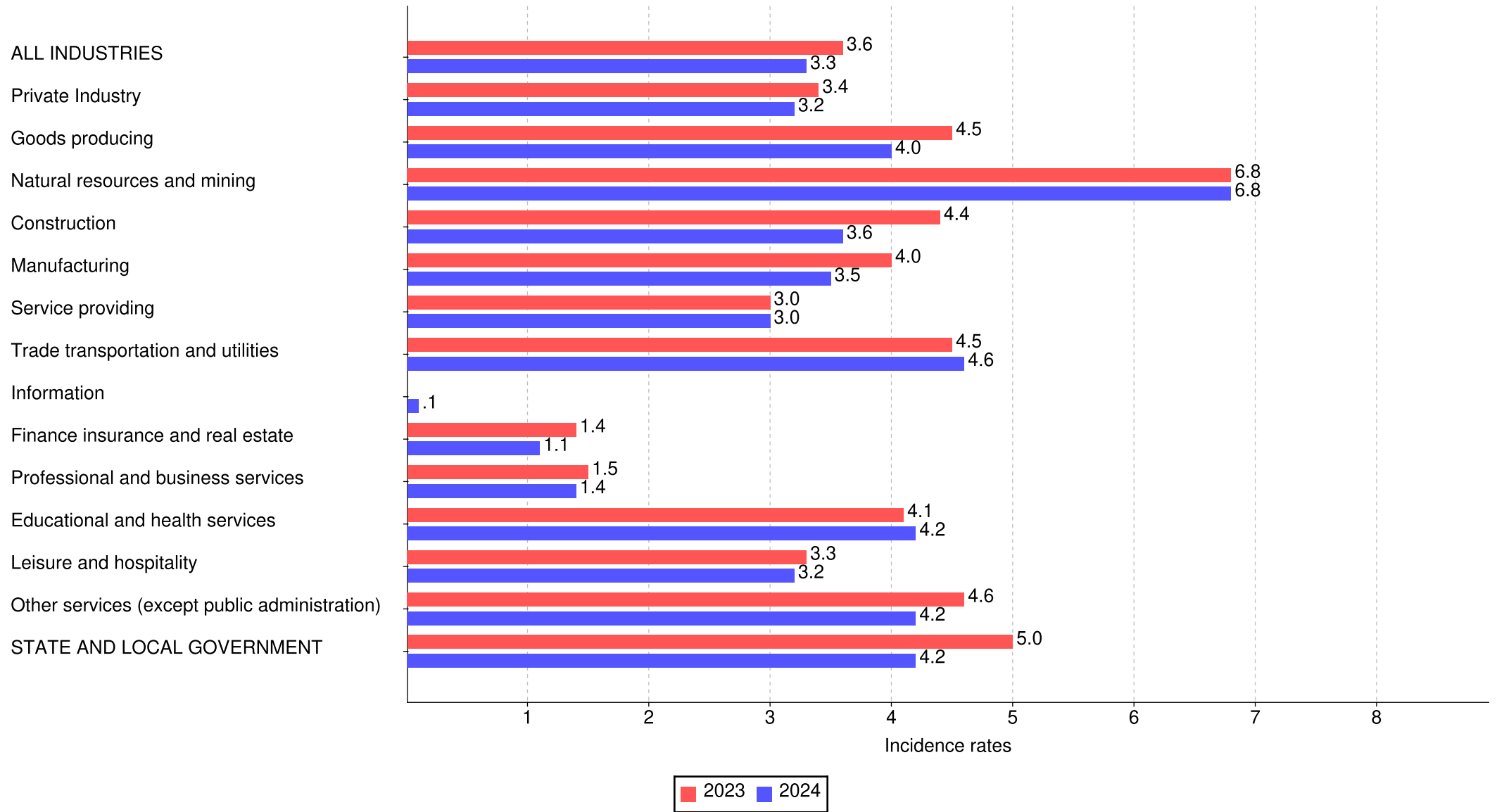

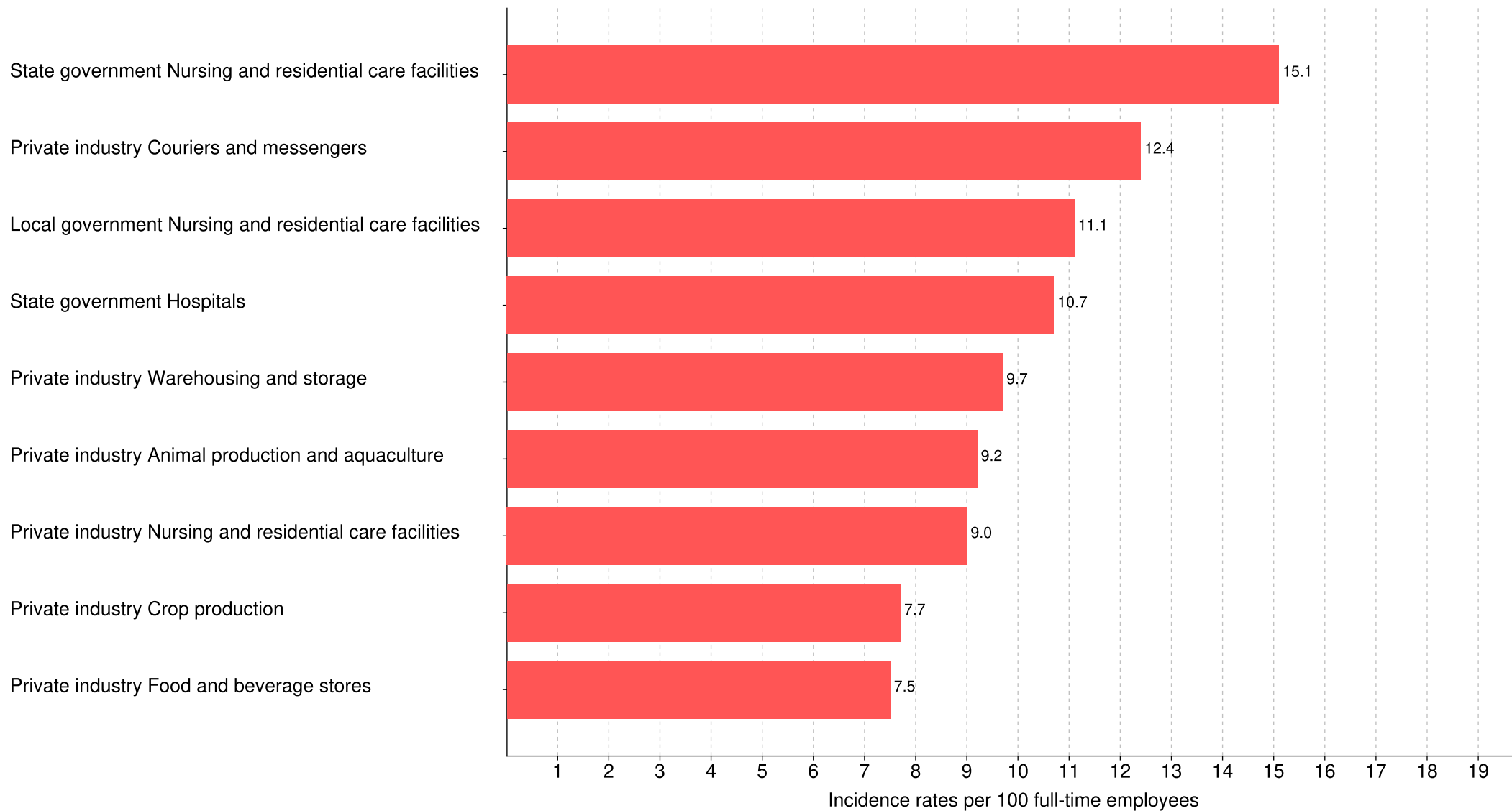

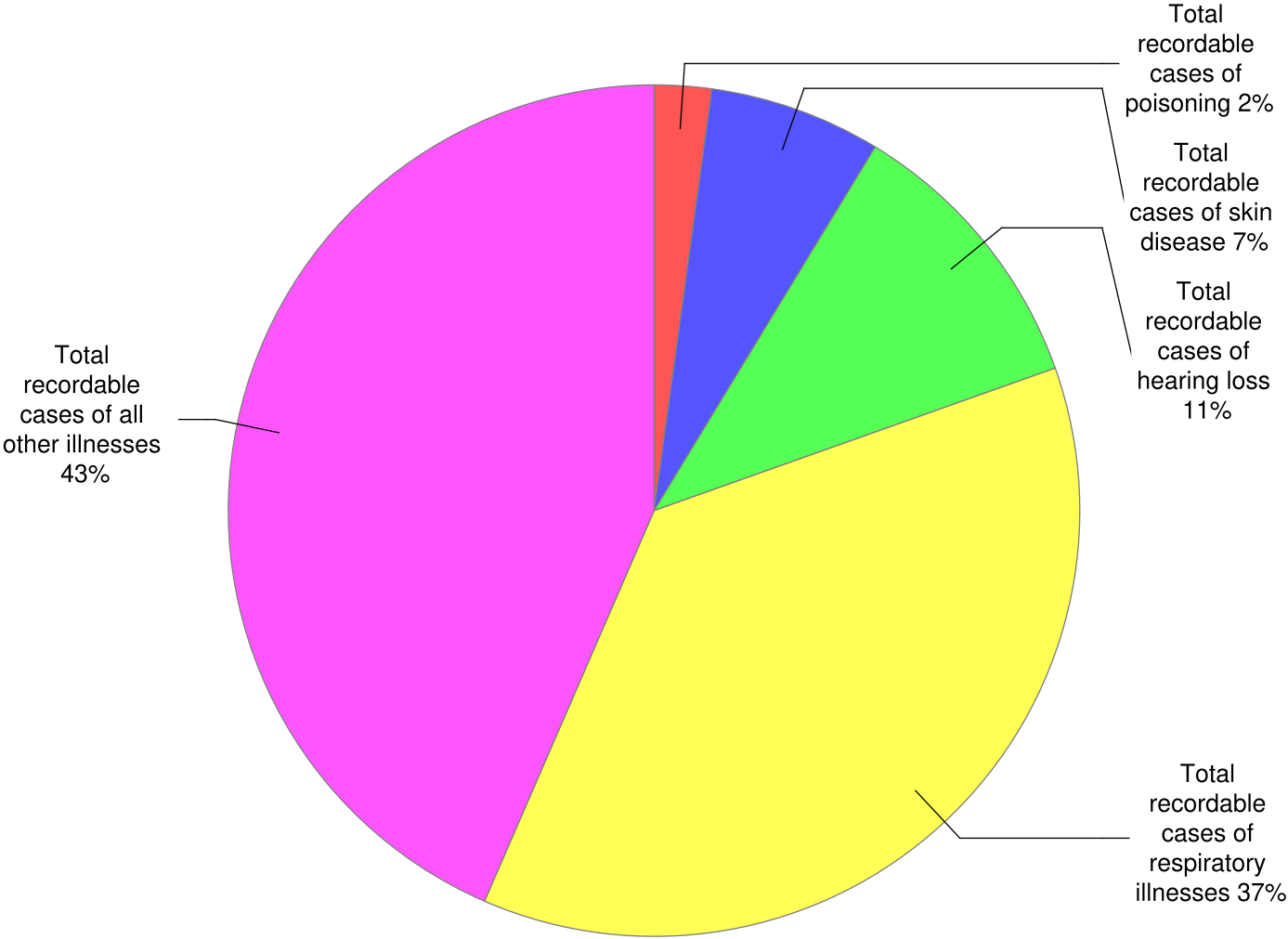

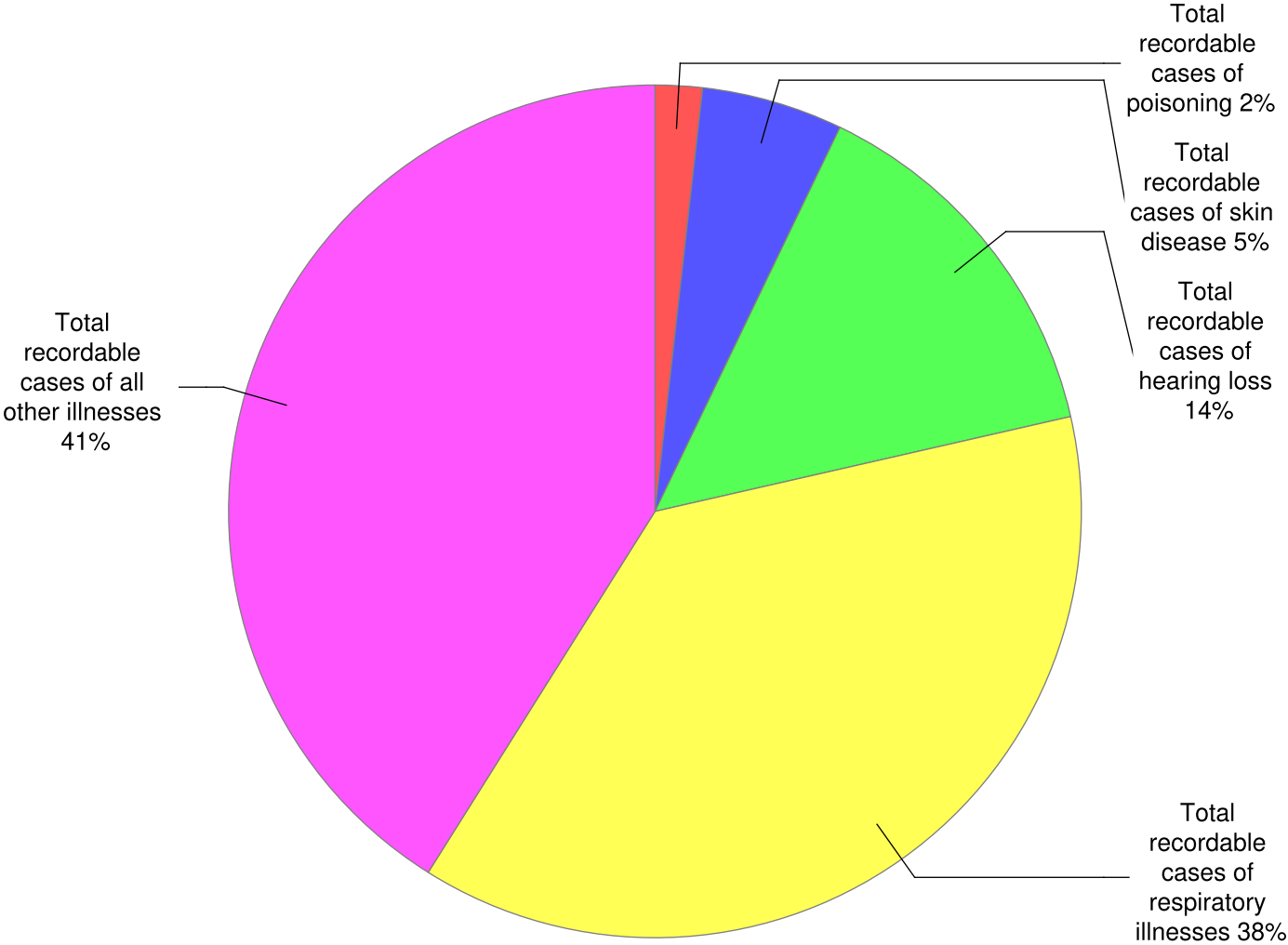
Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, private industry, 2024

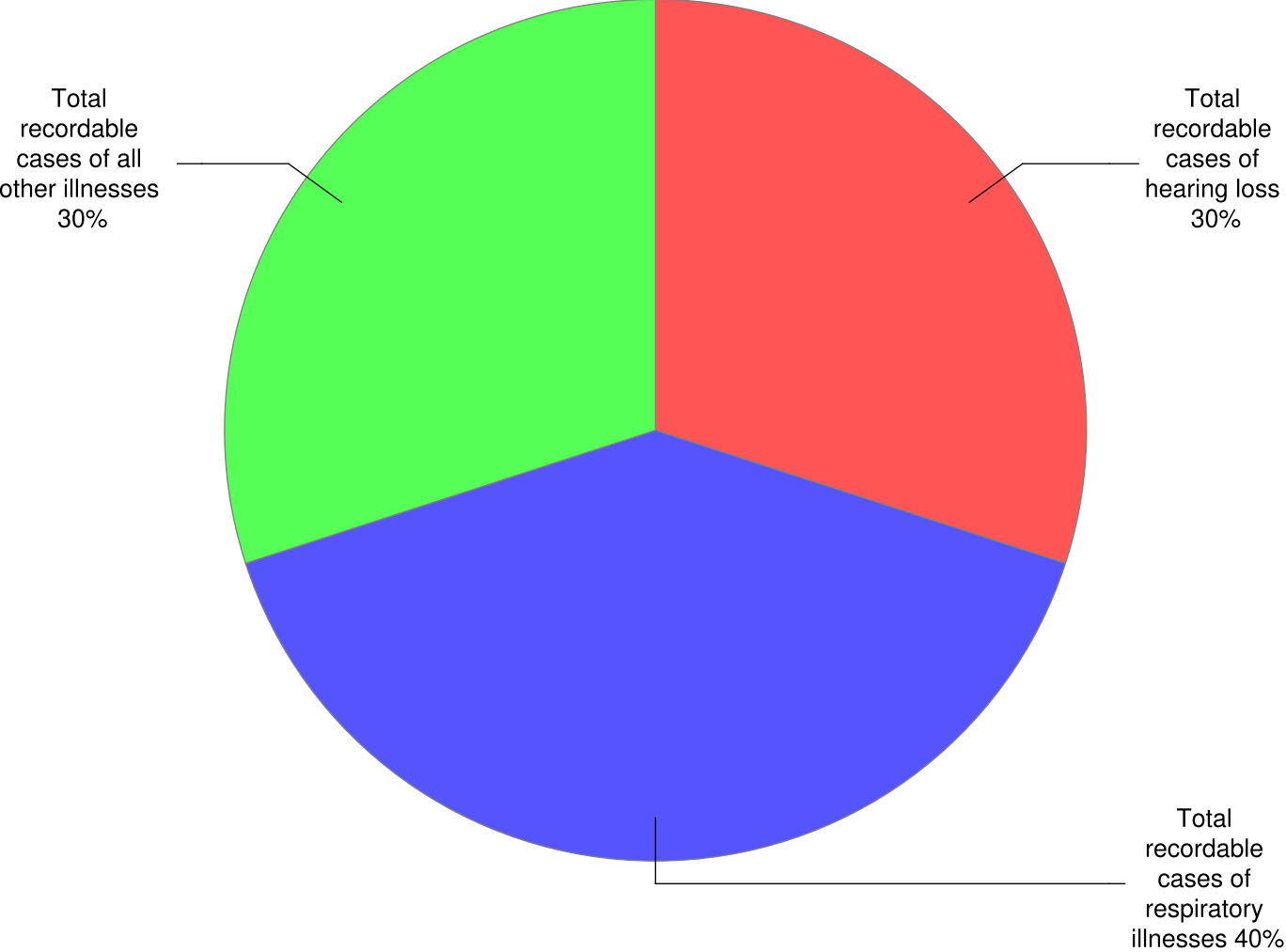
Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, all ownerships, 2024

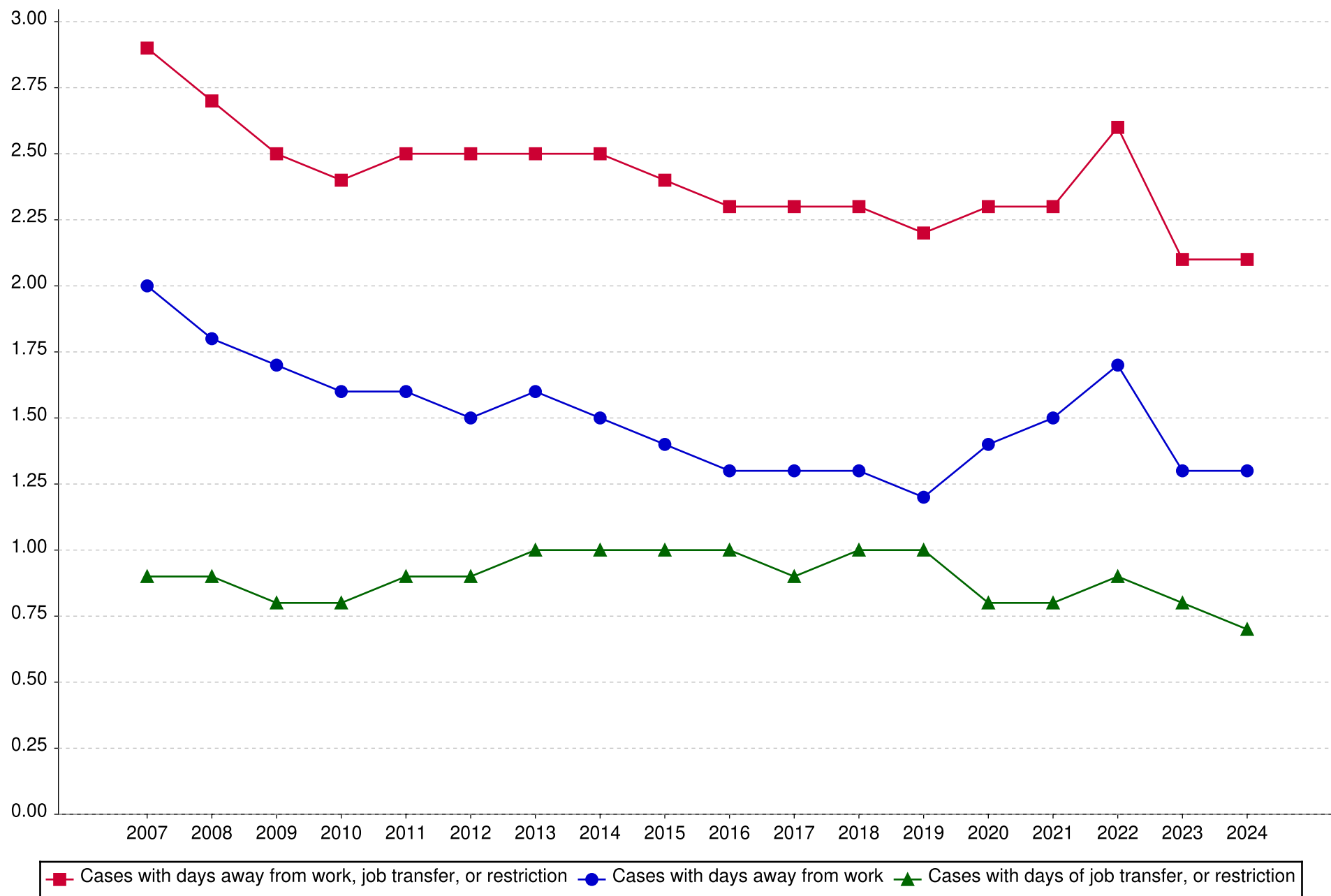
Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, state and local government, 2024

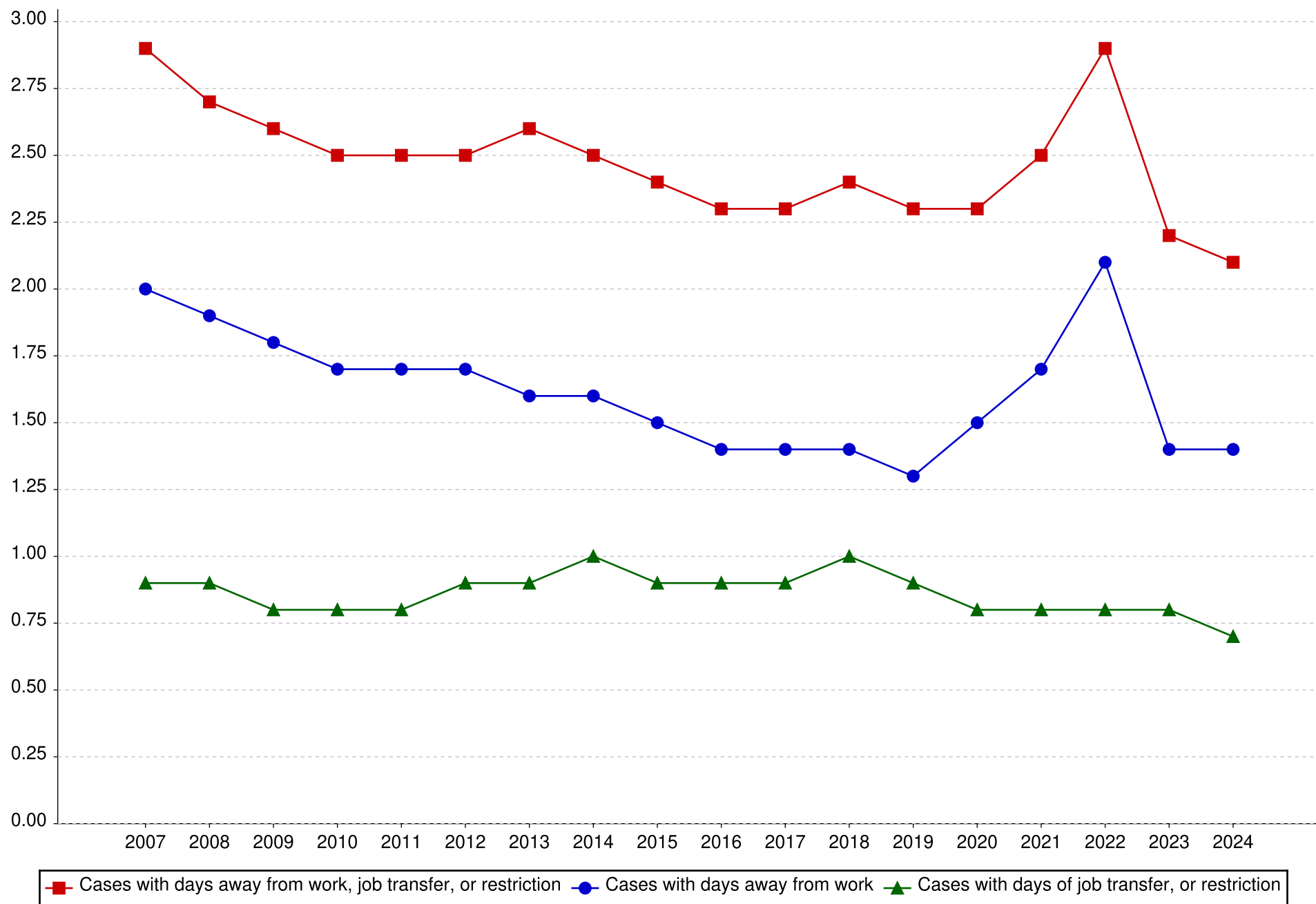

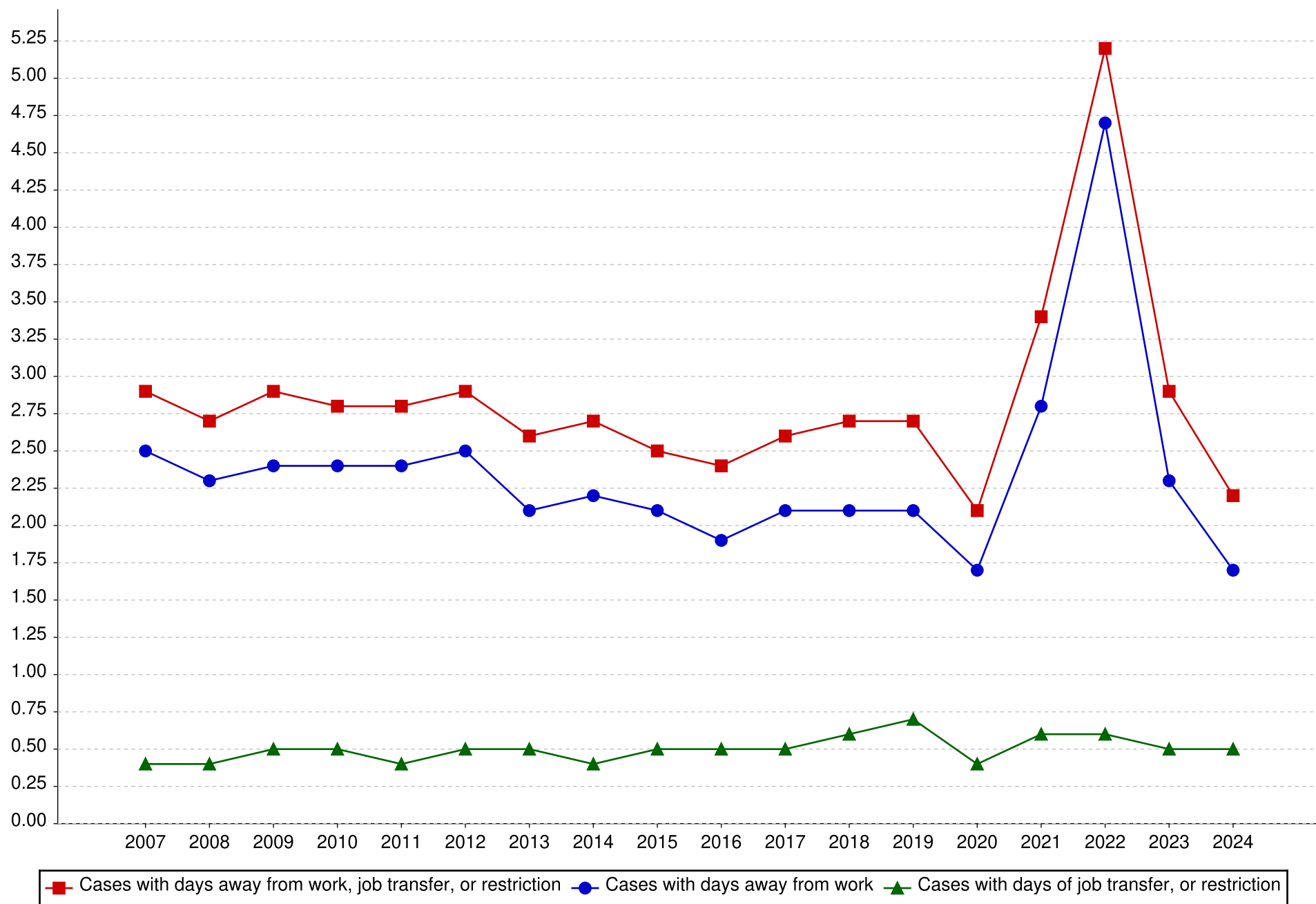

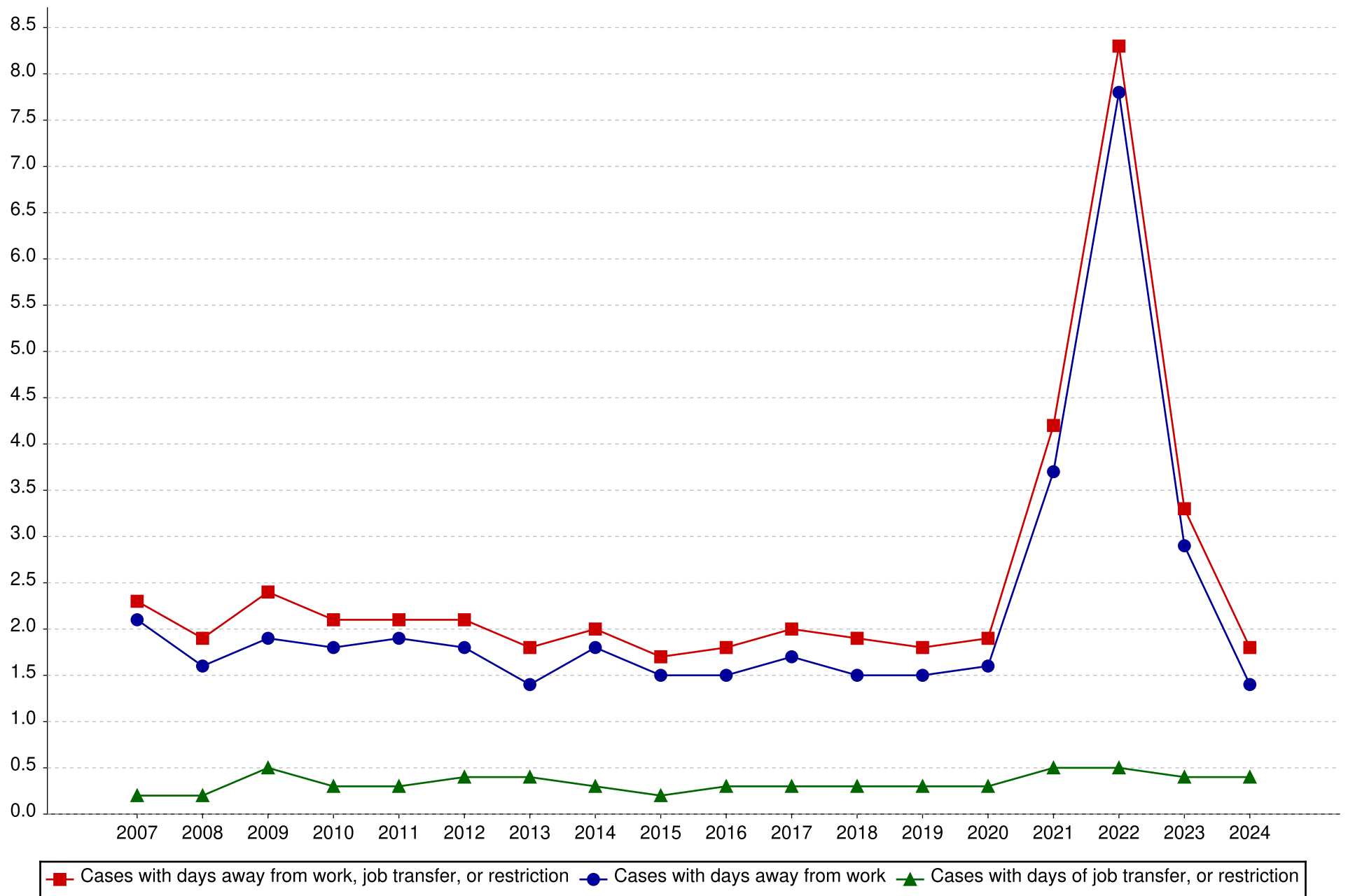

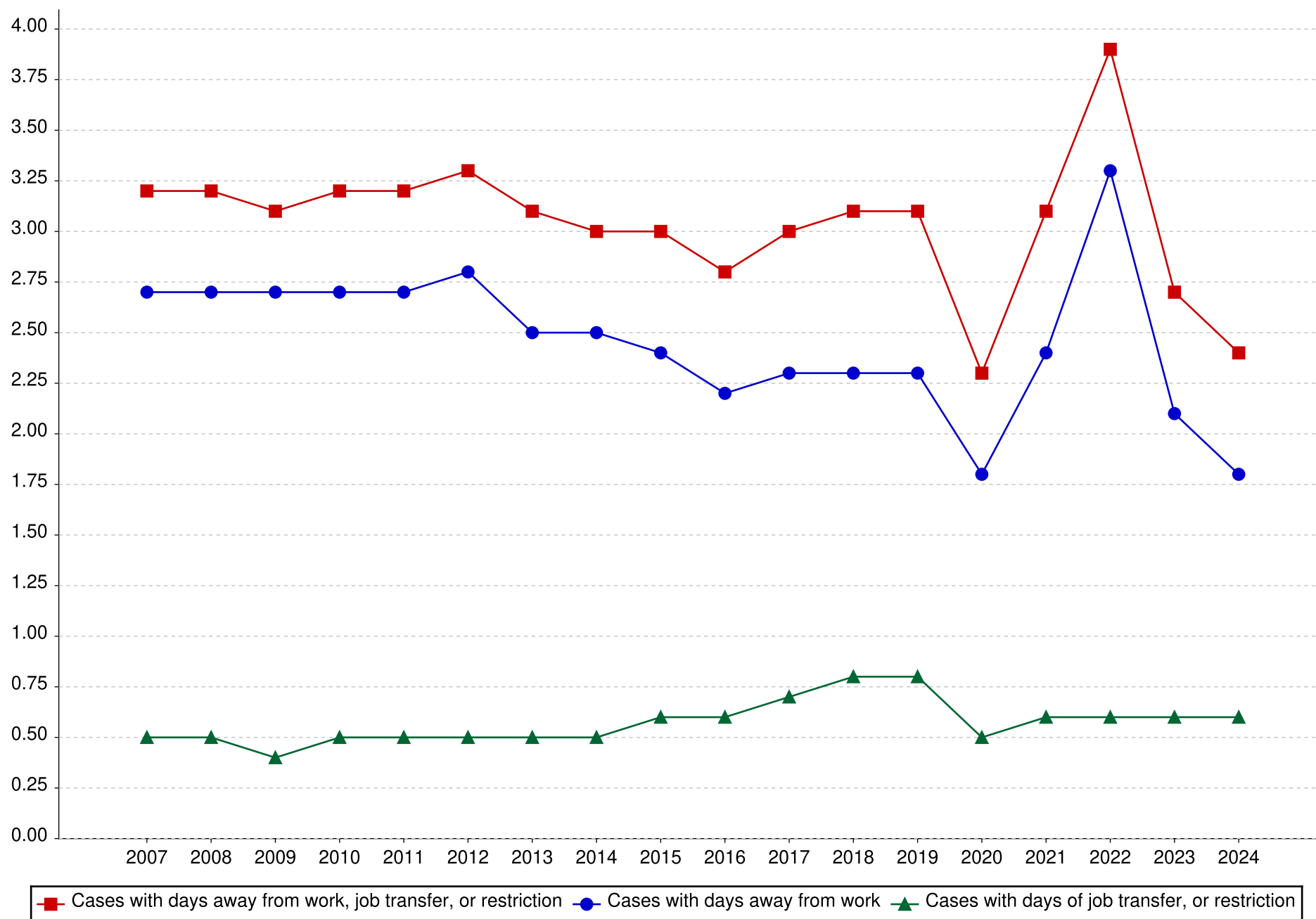

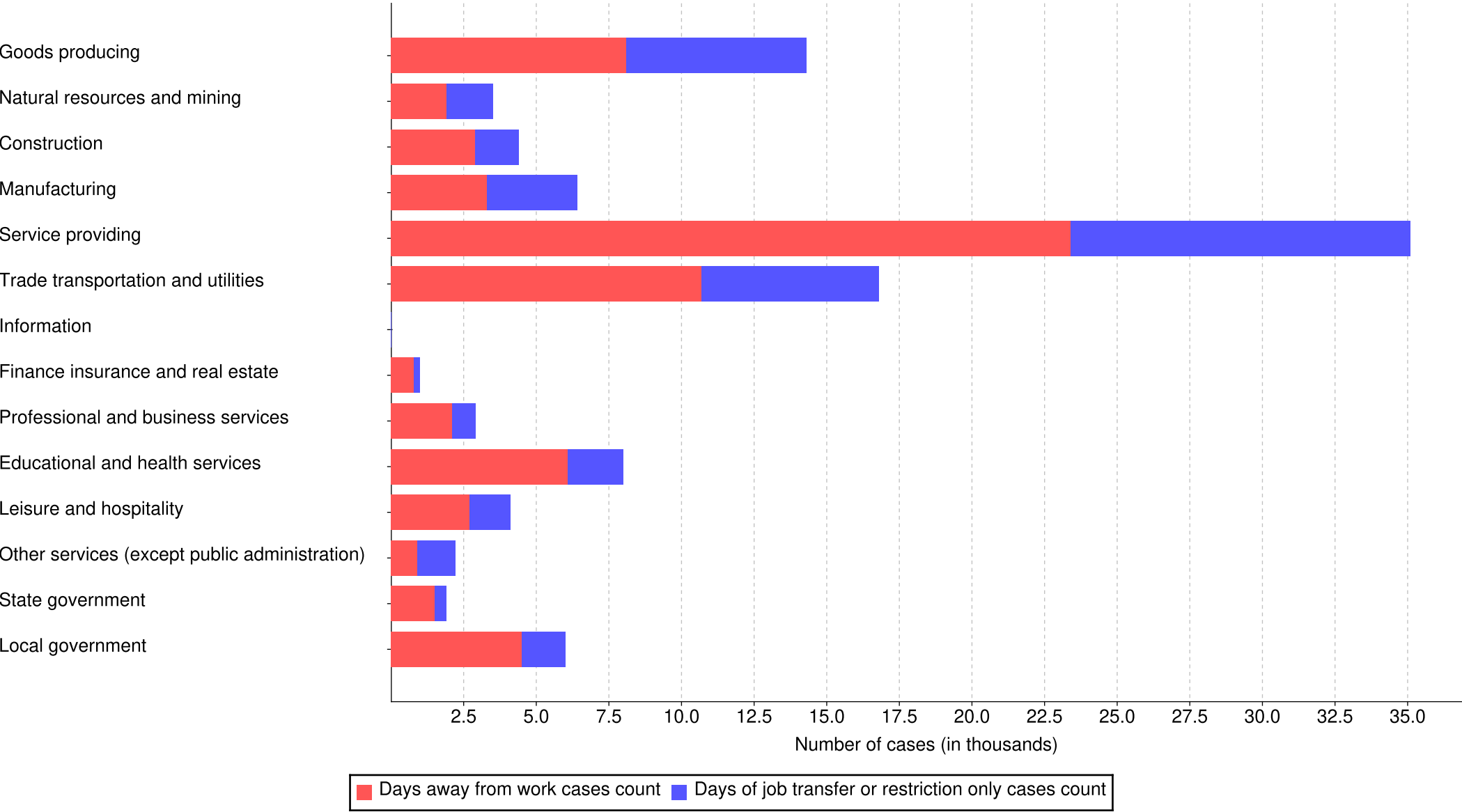

Number of nonfatal occupational injury and illness cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction by private industry sector, state government, and local government, Washington, 2024

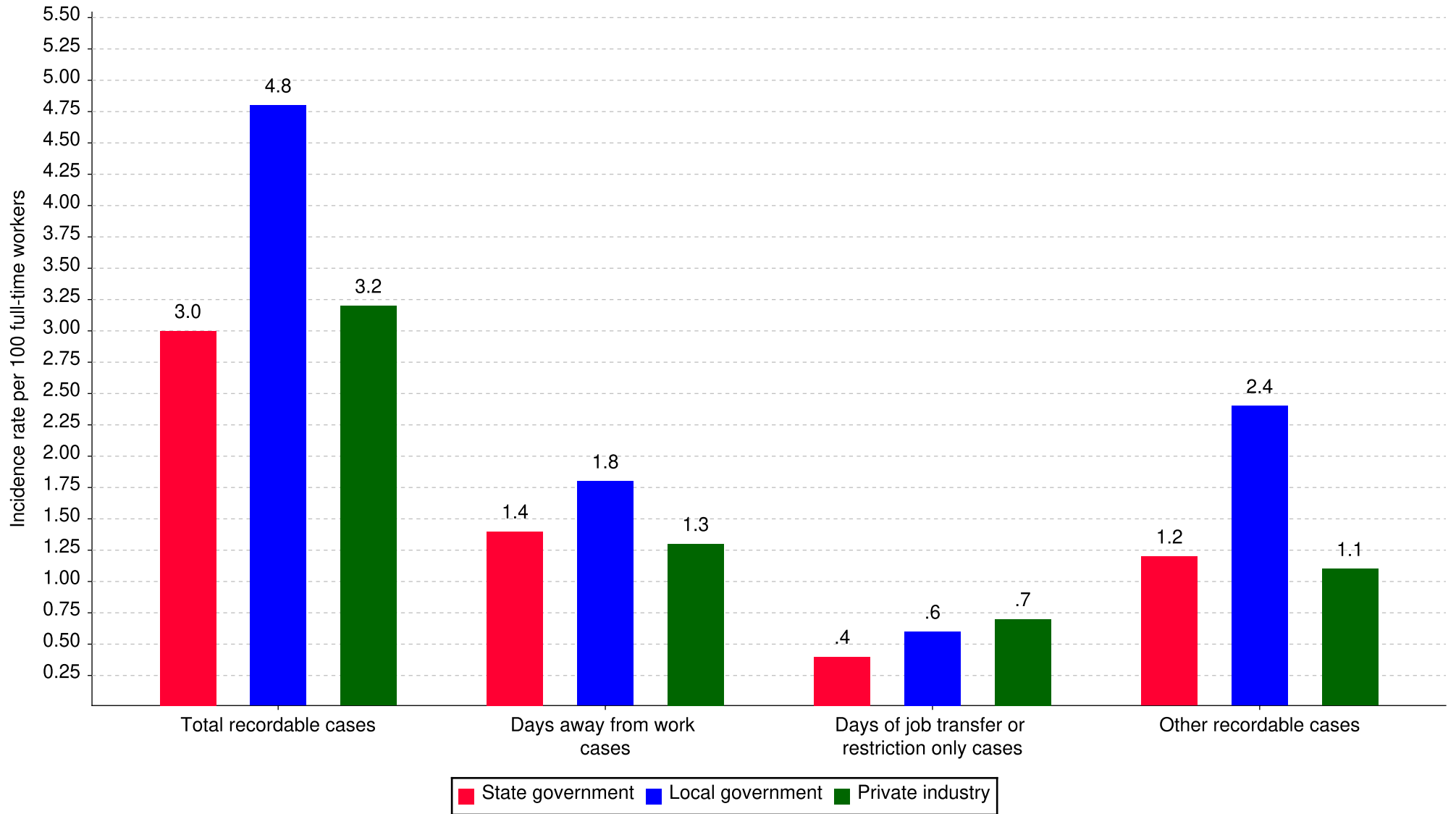

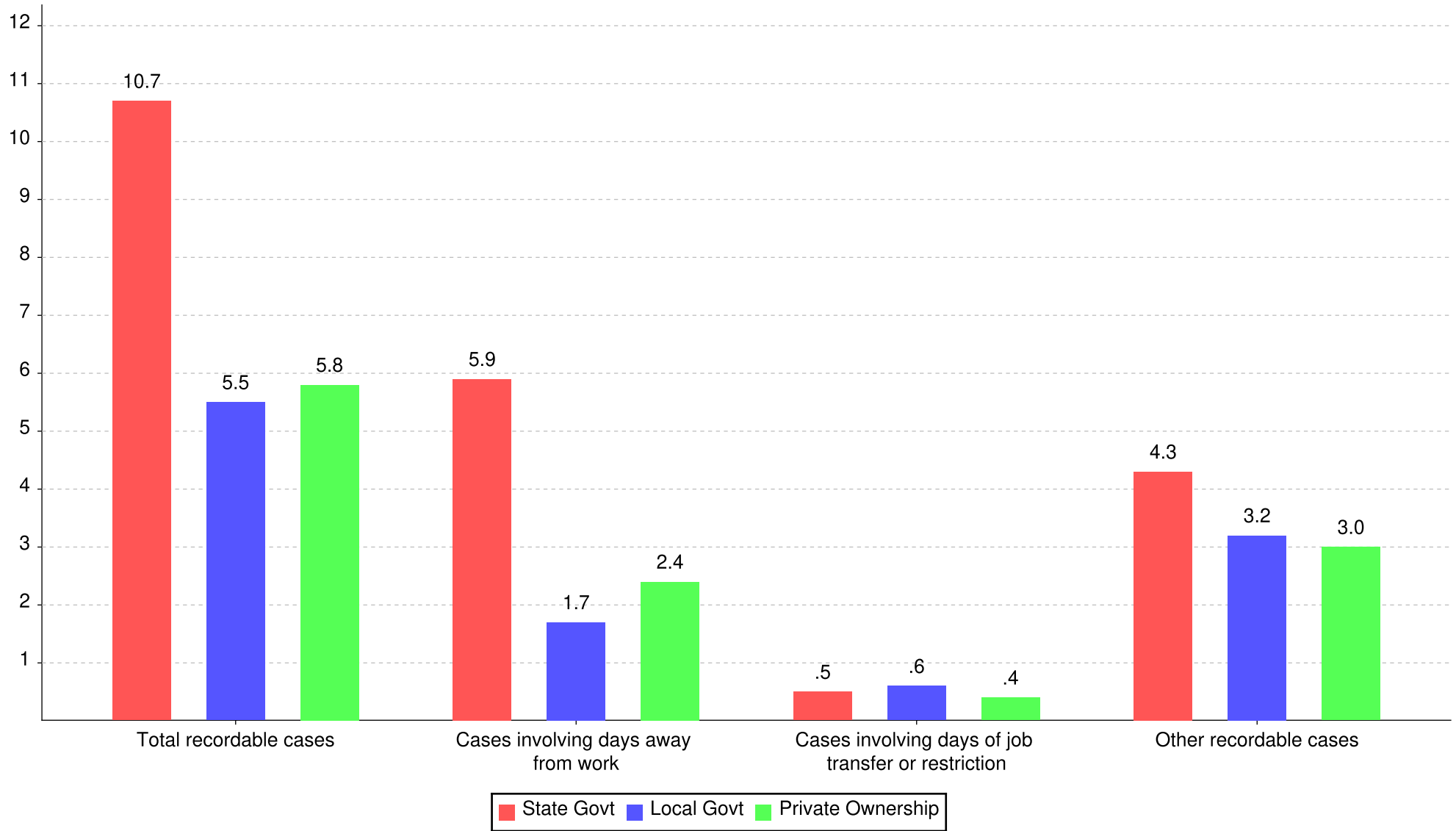
