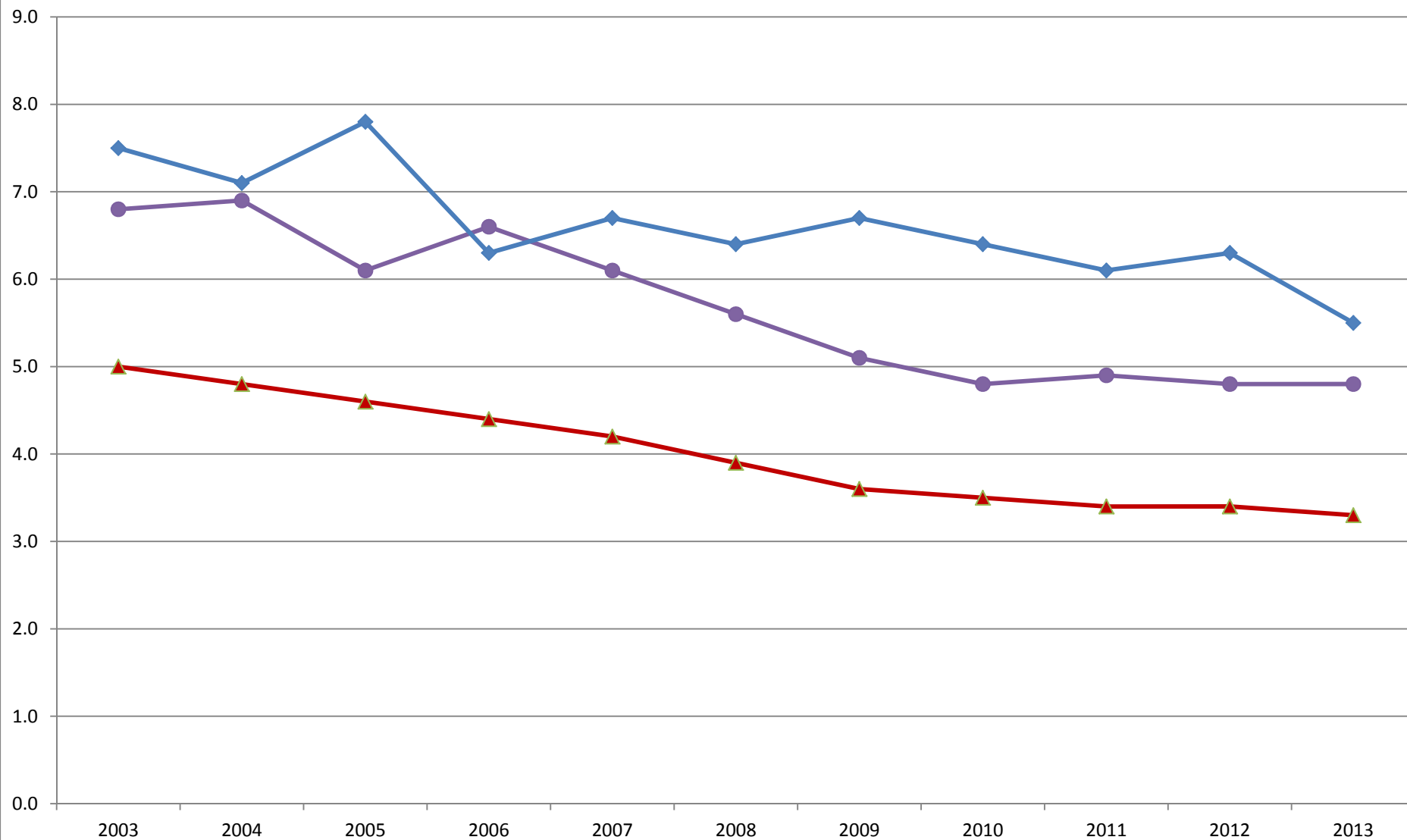

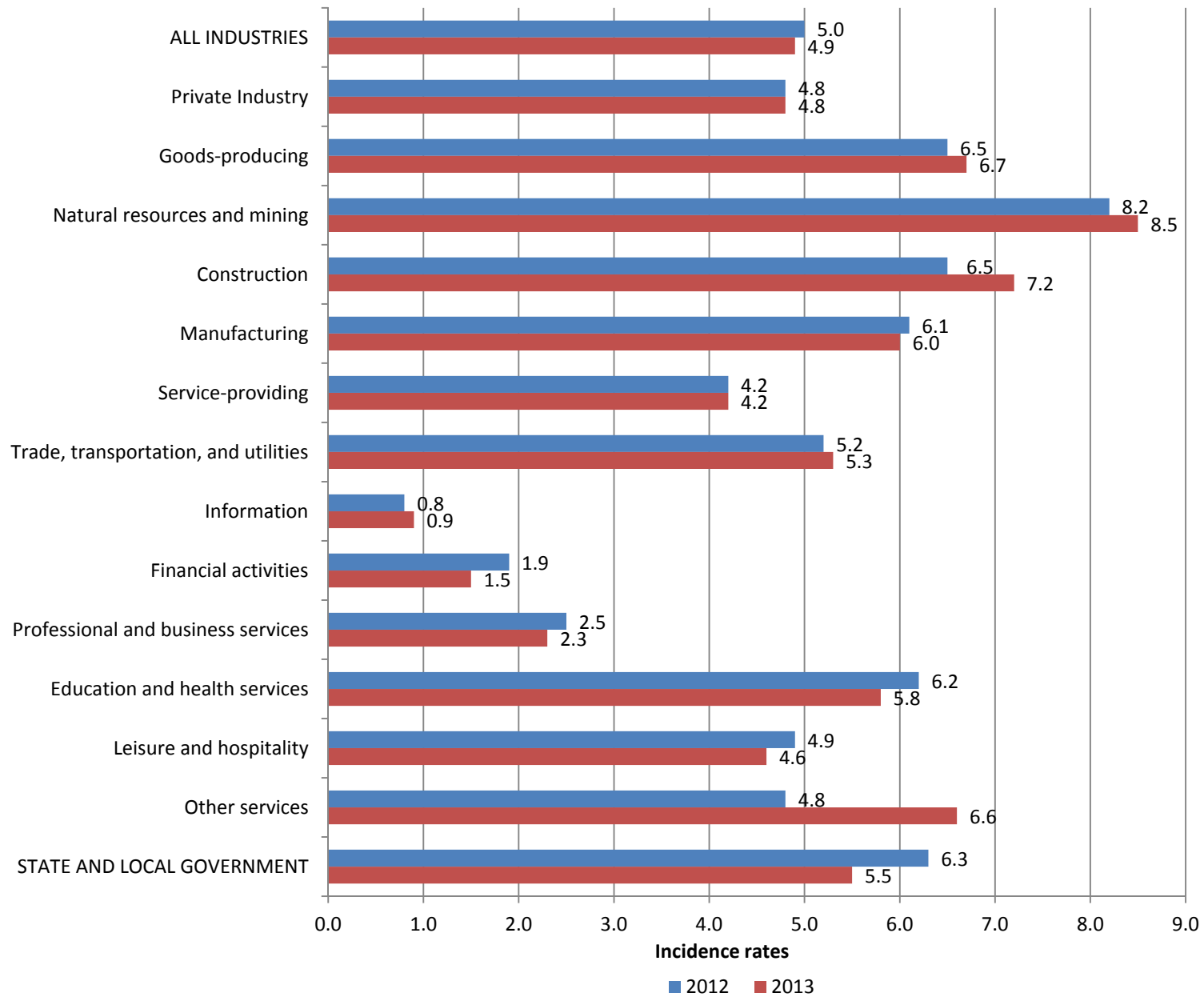

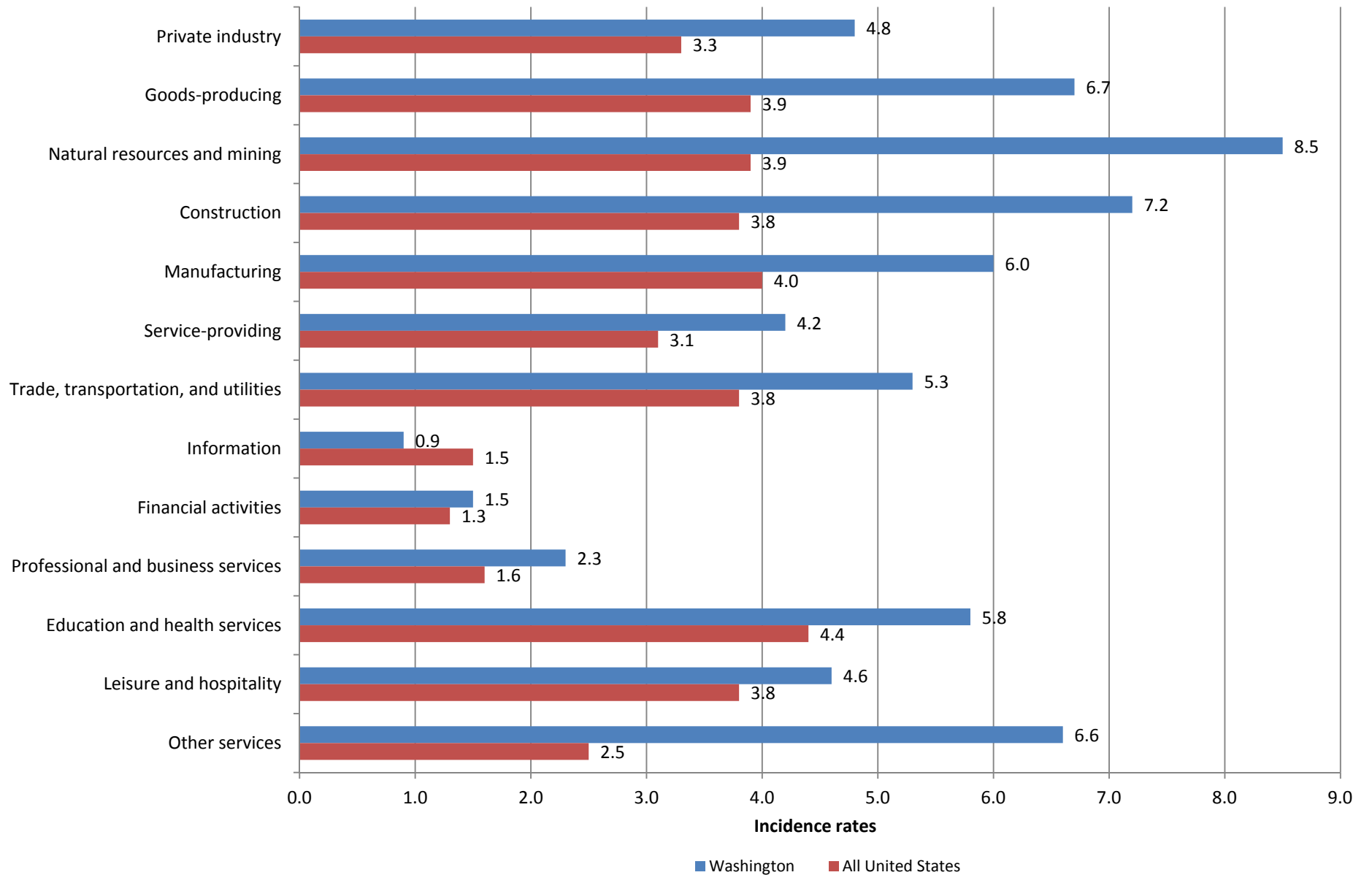

Incidence rates per 100 full-time workers for total nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses by major industry sector, Washington, 2012 & 2013



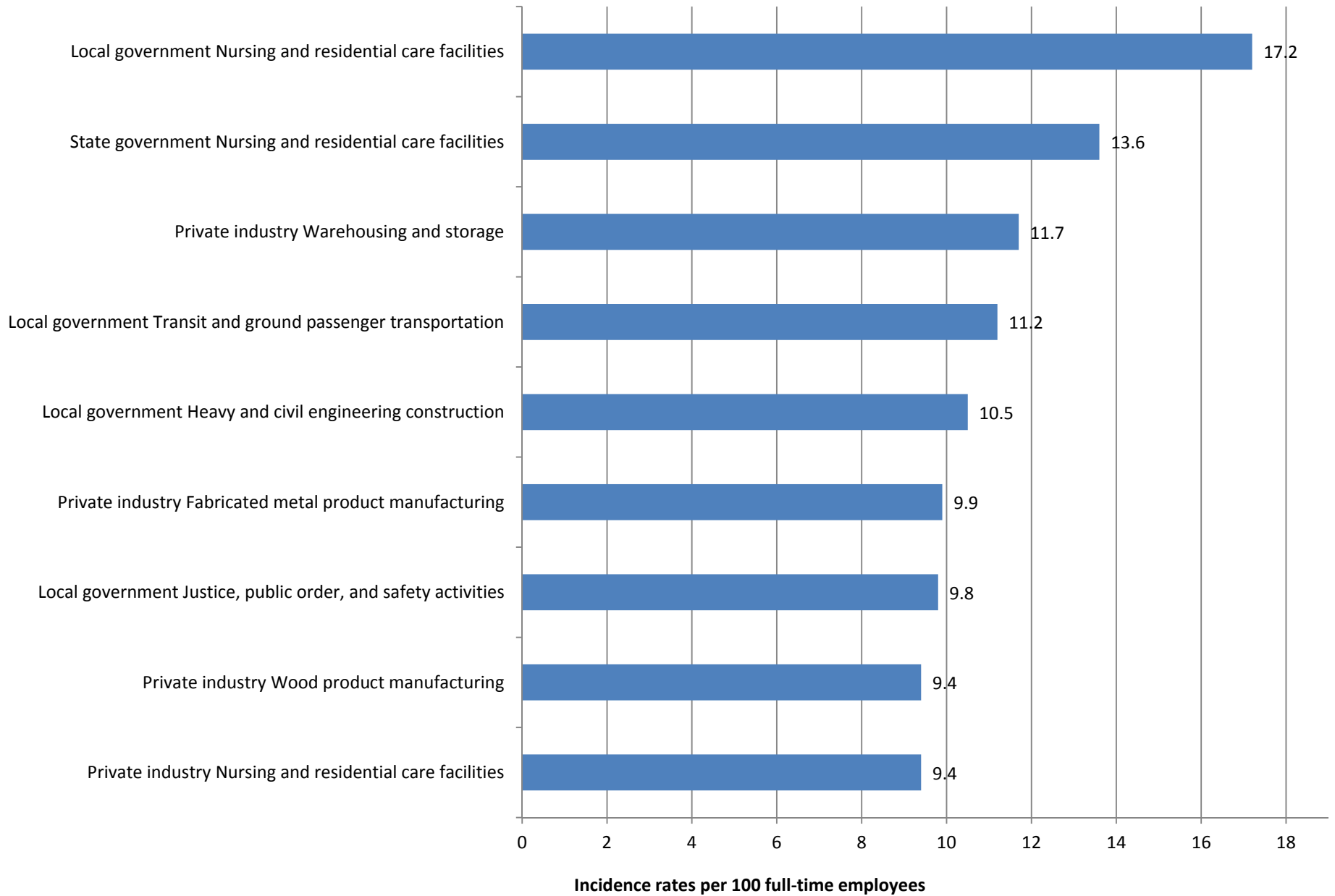
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Incidence rates per 100 full-time workers for total nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses by major industry sector, Washington and All United States, 2013



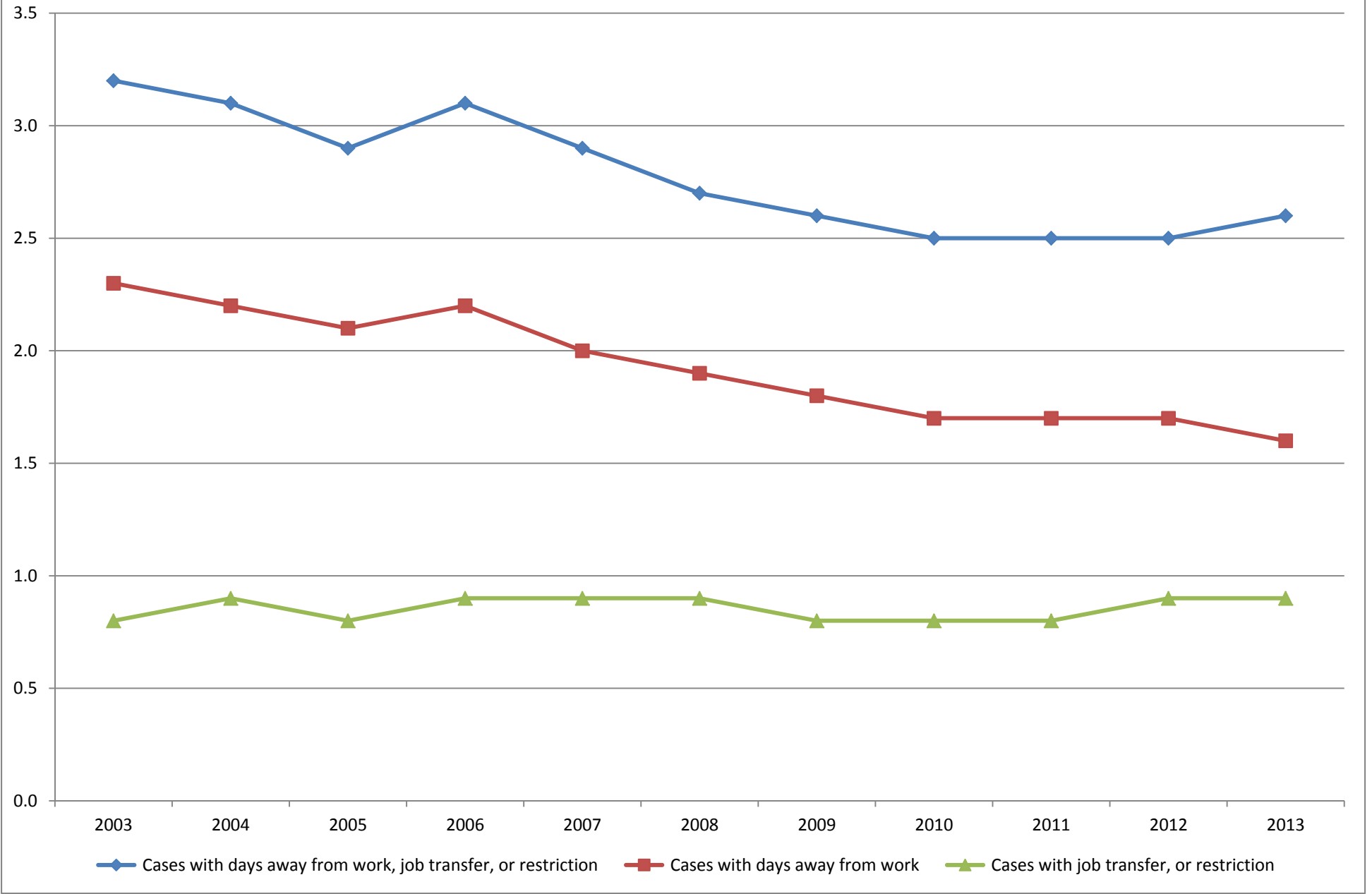

Nonfatal occupational injury and illness incidence rates by case type, Washington, all ownerships, 2003-2013



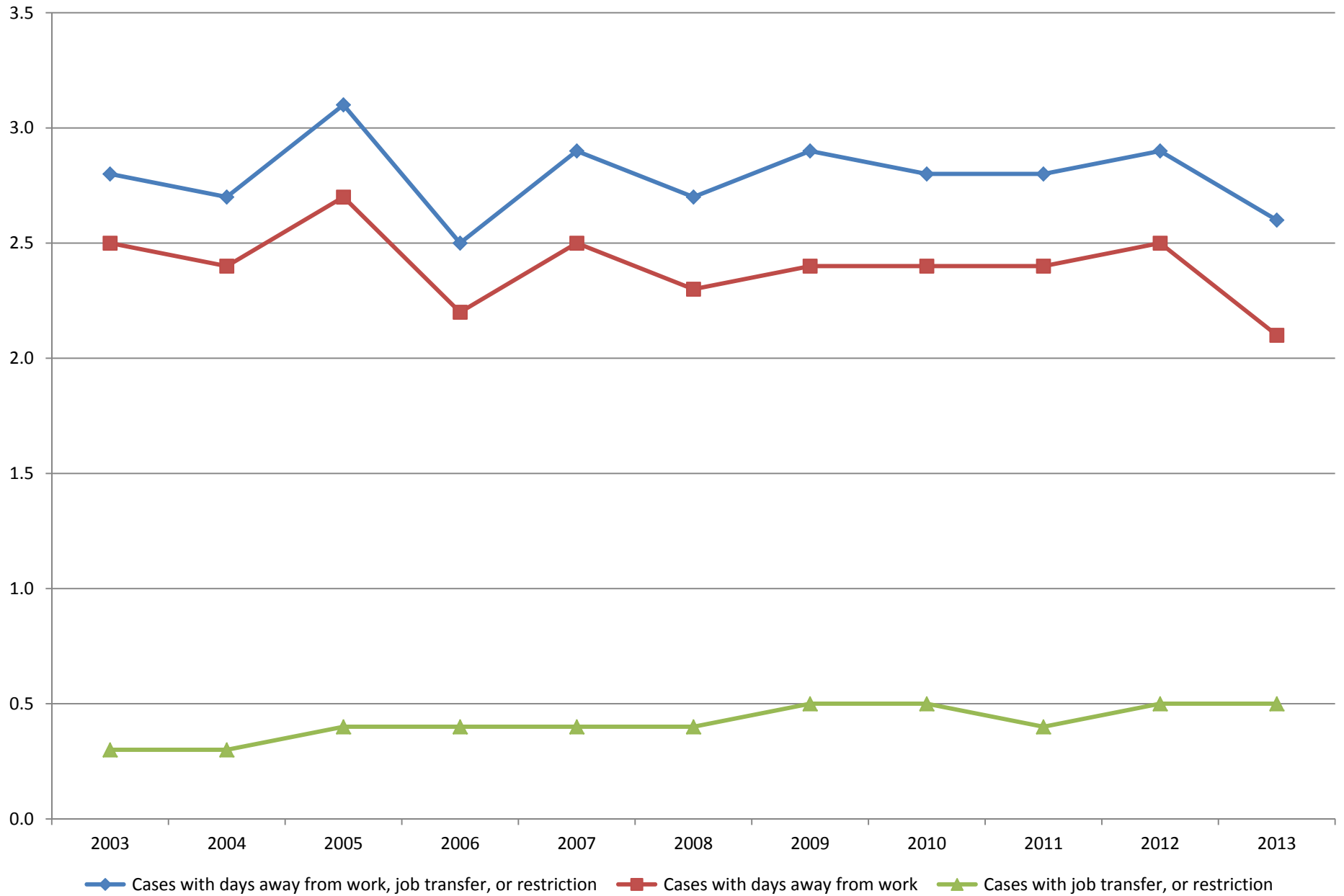
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Nonfatal occupational injury and illness incidence rates by case type, Washington, private industry, 2003-2013



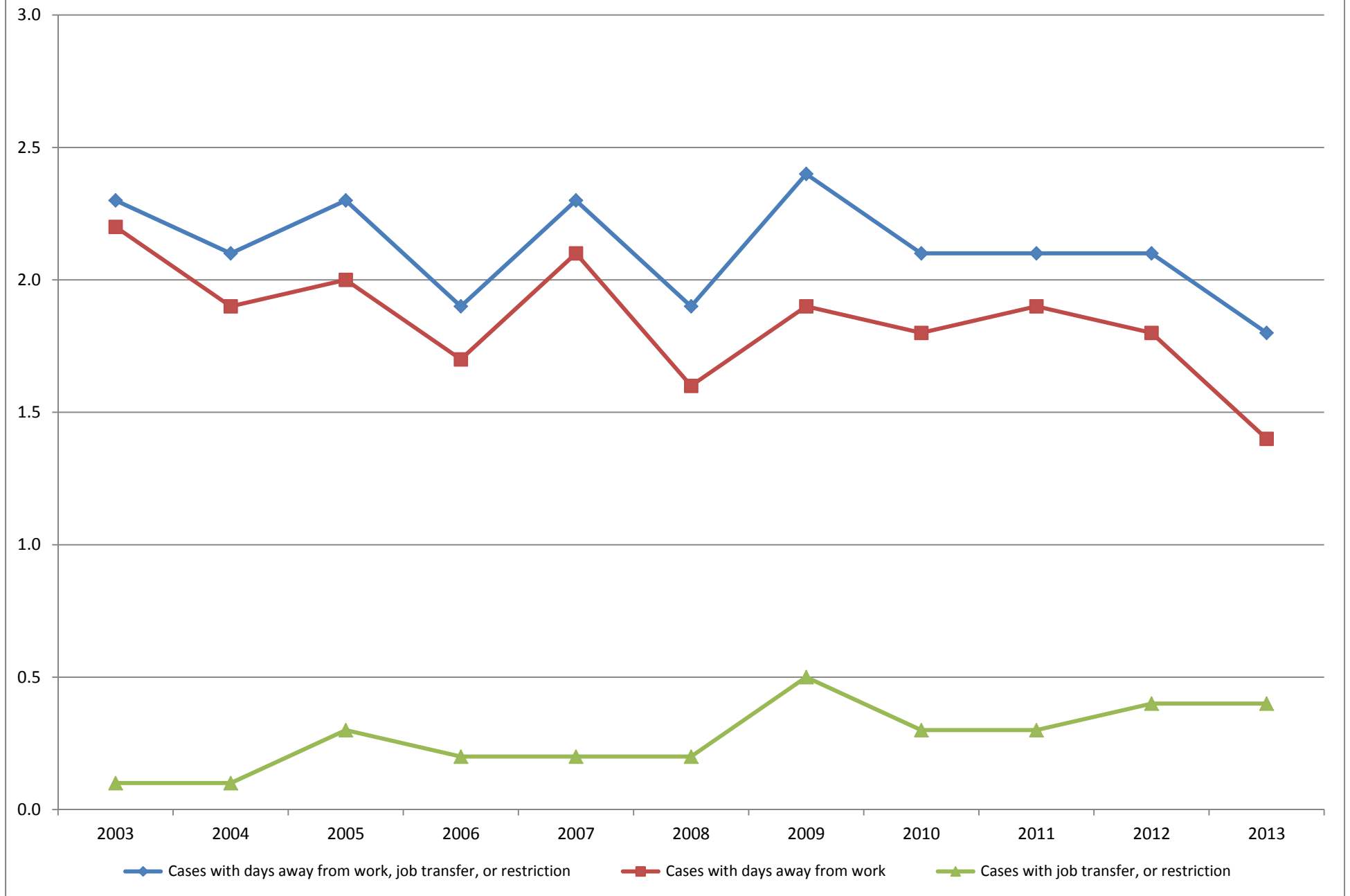
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Nonfatal occupational injury and illness incidence rates by case type, Washington, state and local government, 2003-2013



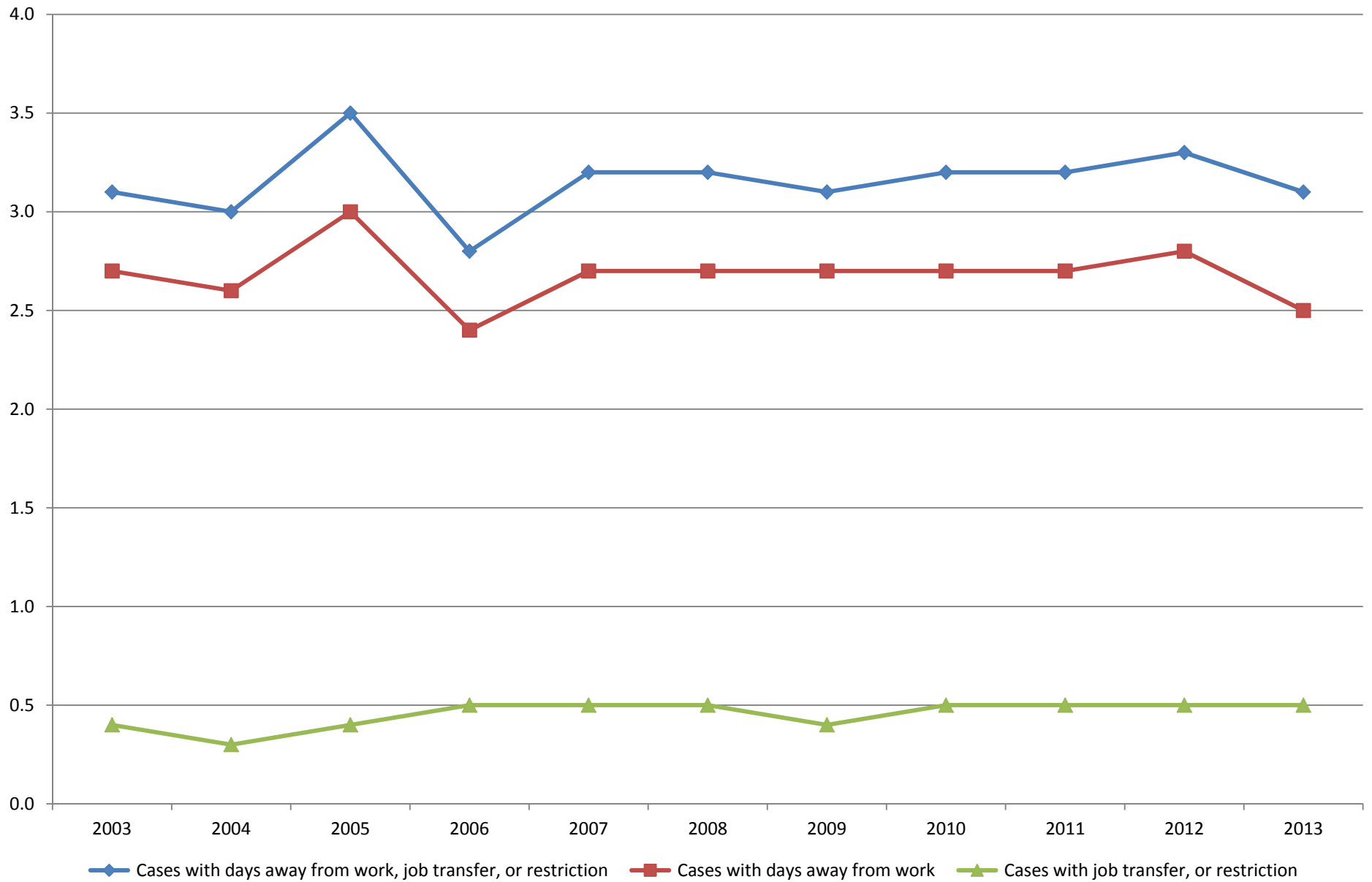

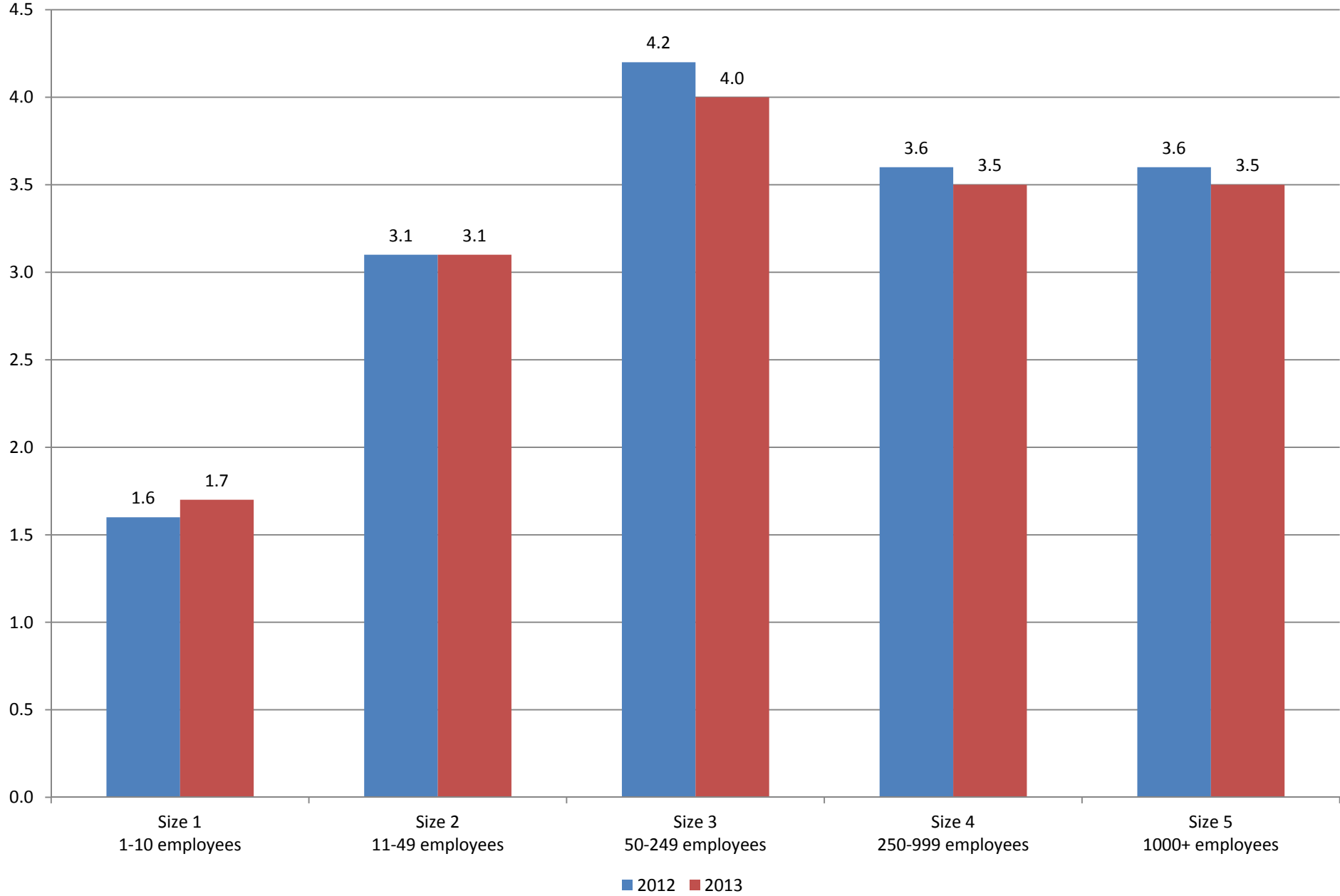

Nonfatal occupational injury and illness incidence rates by case type, Washington, local government, 2003-2013



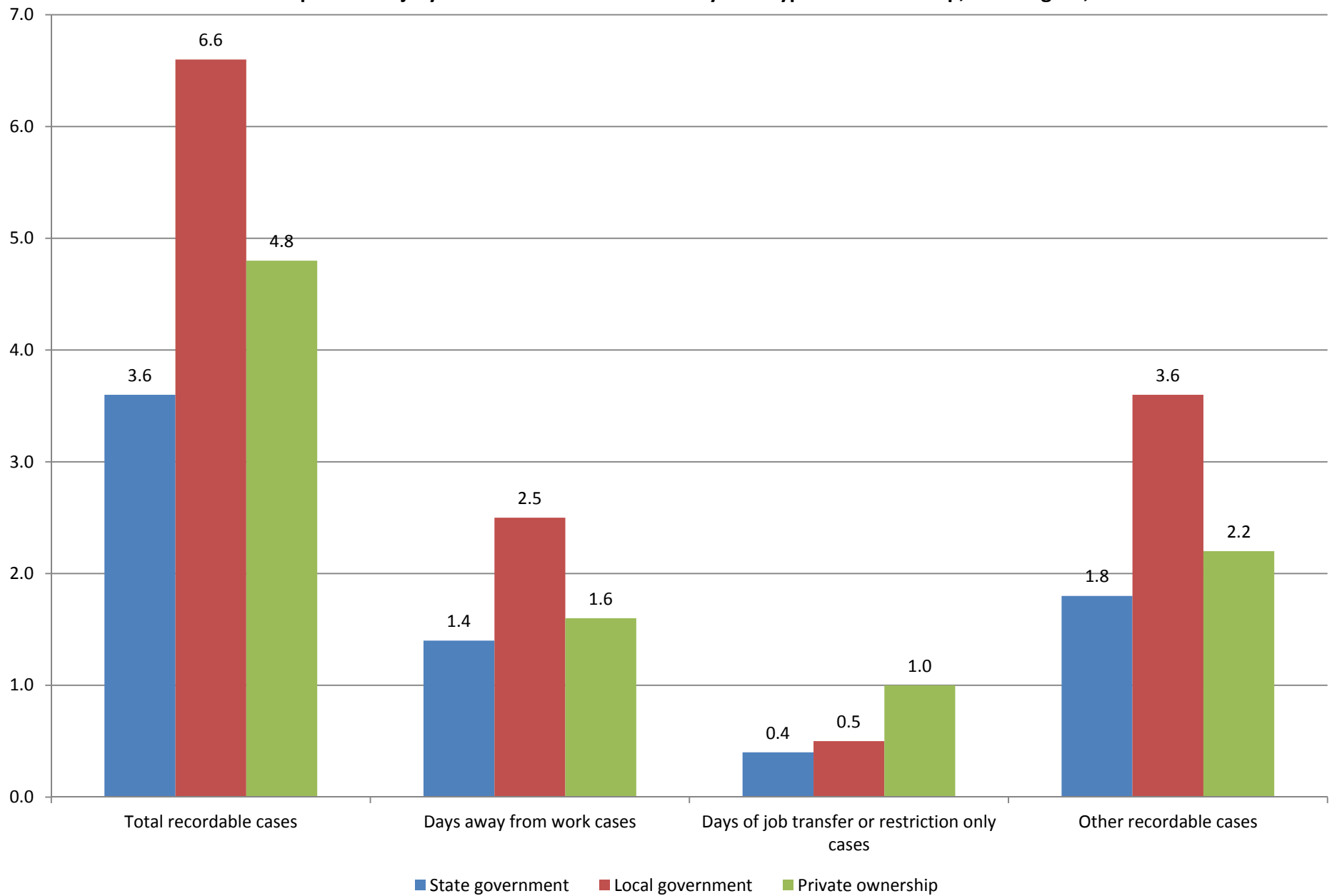

Incidence rates of occupational injuries and illnesses by size class, Washington, 2013



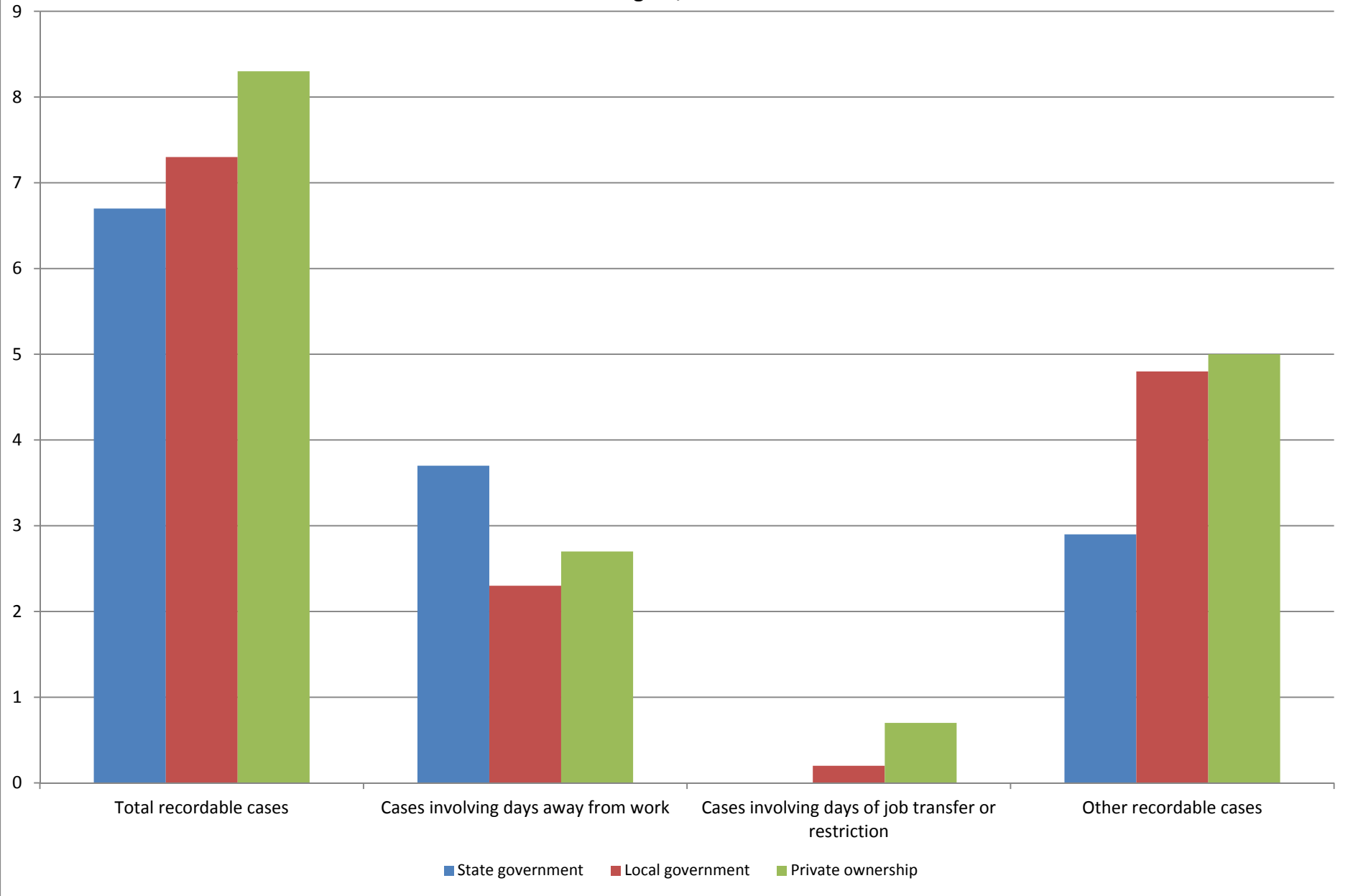

Nonfatal occupational injury and illness incidence rates by case type and ownership, Washington, 2013



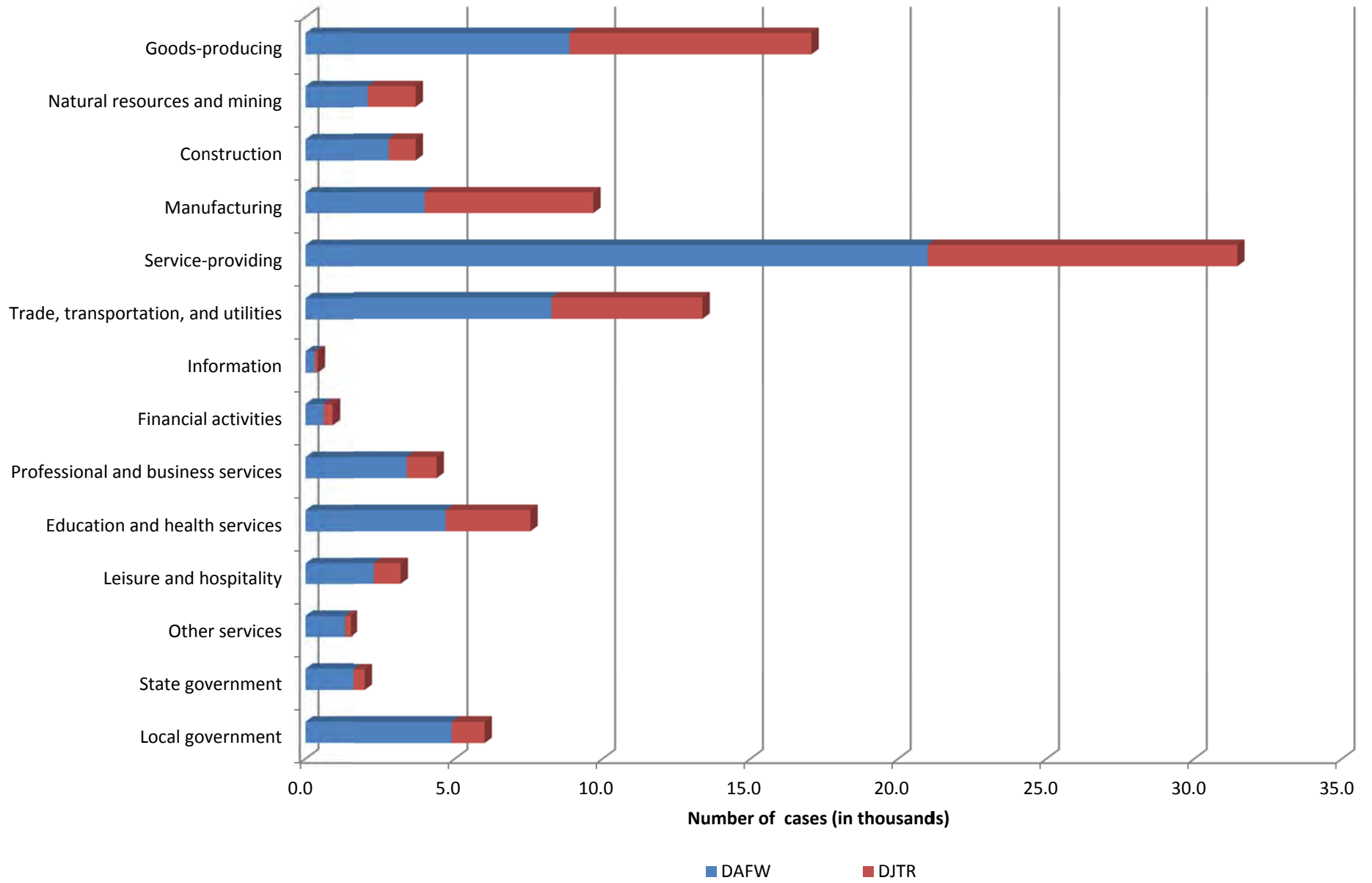

Incidence rates of occupational injuries and illnesses in hospitals (NAICS 622) by ownership and case type, Washington, 2013



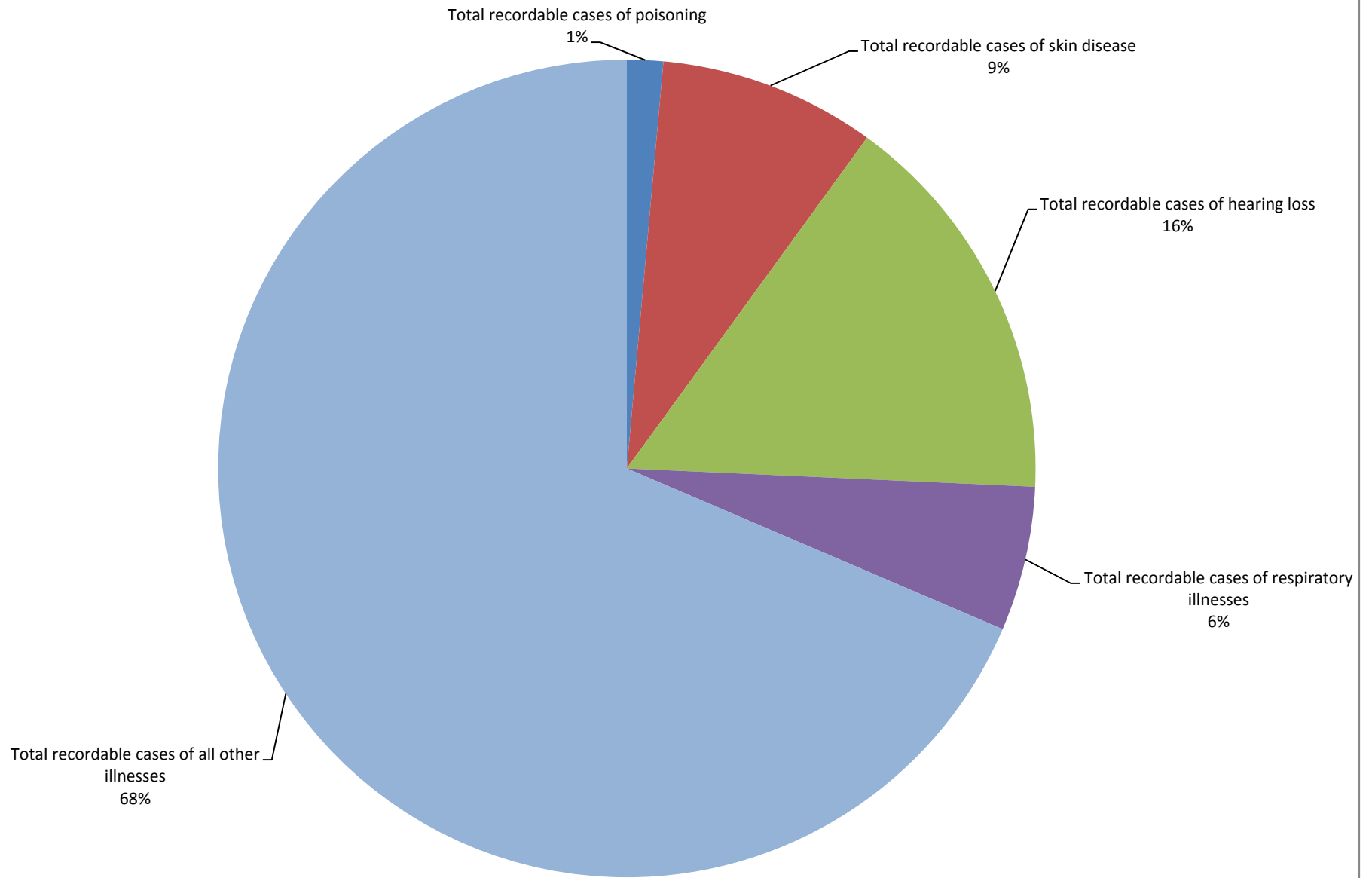

Number of nonfatal occupational injury and illness cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction by private industry sector, state government, and local government, Washington, 2013



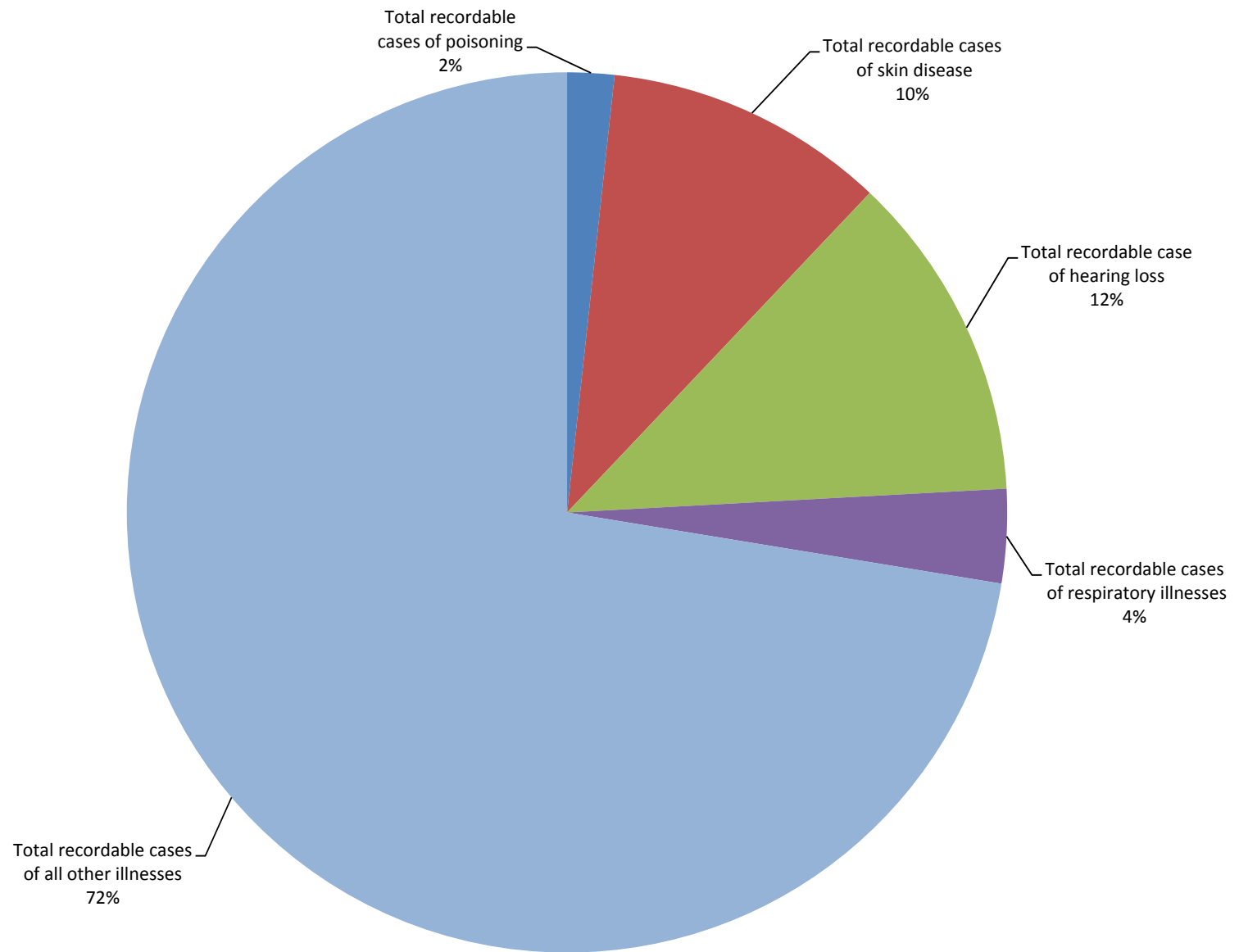

Distribution of illnesses by category of illness, Washington, all ownerships, 2013



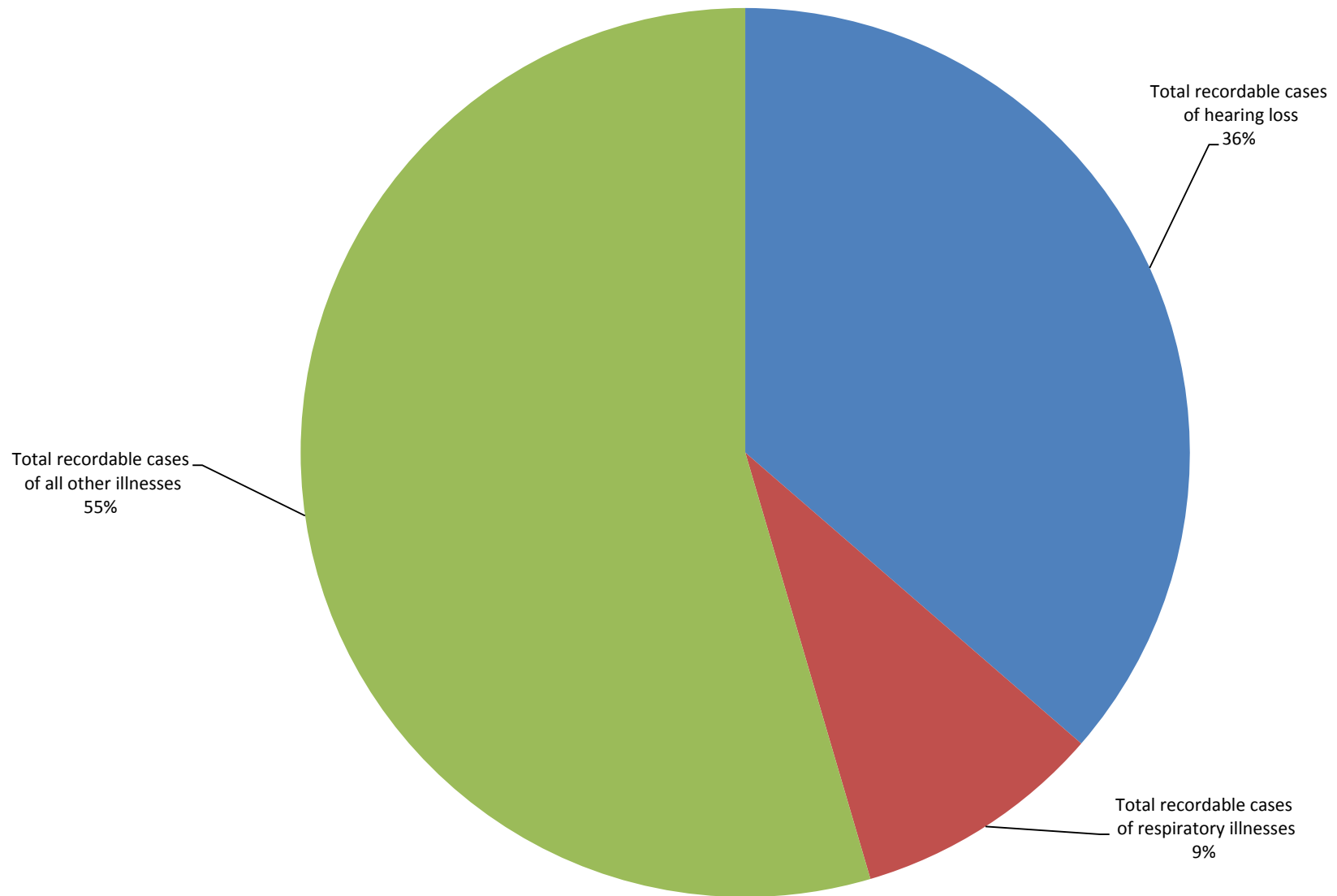
