CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: I'd like to call the Electrical meeting to order on April 25th at approximately 9:24 a.m. So thank you all for attending. I appreciate you making this trip out here, those of you who've made the trip from other locations, like I have, to Spokane. Thank you.

This morning I've asked our Secretary, Mr. Wayne Molesworth, to do a quick simple safety message this morning.

*** SAFETY MESSAGE ***

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: Good morning, Board

Members. And this is a very short brief, but, I think,
an important safety message. Especially this time of
year where the sun is coming up early, on your way to
work driving, just about anyplace, is how do we see out
of our vehicles and what do we see out of vehicles.

There was just recently an accident in the Tumwater area where somebody was driving and wasn't wearing sunglasses. The sun was in their eyes. And they missed a turn and was killed. The determination was if they'd had sunglasses or a clean windshield maybe, they may have been able to avoid that.

So it's always a good idea to carry an extra



pair of sunglasses in your car, because you may forget your sunglasses at home this time of the year. And it might be cloudy in the morning, and at night, when you're going home, you might be driving into the sun as it's setting.

So my safety topic today is keep that extra pair of sunglasses in your car and wear your sunglasses when you're driving. And make sure that they are the type that really -- what do they call those -- photovoltaic, yeah, or -- not photovoltaic, no, those will burn the crap out of you. Whatever you say, make sure that they're photo sensitive, right, and give you good clarity. Anyway, that was it.

The other part of the safety topic today is that, you know, if one person has to give the safety topic too often, it can be mentally distressing. And so I'd appreciate a volunteer next time to give safety topics at the next meeting.

So I do want to make sure I've said it. We actually do you have a quorum so we are good to go and move forward.



17	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: All right. So we're on to
18	our next item, and I didn't bring a sheet up here, for
19	Appeals. And so did we have someone here from Interior
20	Electric?
21	I'm hearing nothing. We have counsel here from
22	the Department.
23	JOHN BARNES: Yes, Your Honor. John Barnes,
24	Assistant Attorney General for the State of Washington,
25	Donartmont of Jahor & Industries



Yes, this is somewhat of an unusual appeal. 1 2 Inspector Steele was out --3 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: One second, let me do the introduction to the rest of this to make sure. 5 The matter before us today is an appeal in the 6 matter of the Interior Electric, Incorporated, and Wayne S. Marvin, Docket No. 06-2023-LI-1905, and 7 06-2023-LI-1906. The hearing is being held pursuant to 9 due and proper notice to all interested parties in 10 Spokane, Washington, on April 25th, 2020, at 11 approximately 9:27 a.m. 12 This is the appeal from the original initial 13 order issued by the Office for Administrative Hearings 14 on November 28, 2023. It is my understanding that the 15 decision set aside citation notices, ESTLU01538, 16 ESTLU01539, ESTLU01541 issued by the Department of 17 Labor & Industries on December 21st, 2022. 18 It is further my understanding that the 19 Department has timely appealed the decision to the 20 Electrical Board. And we're now to this point where, 21 if you would like to give your statement. 22 Thank you. JOHN BARNES: 23 This is a Department appeal. And the issue is 24 whether or not the replacement of the fuel dispenser at 25



Steele was out and he became aware that fuel dispensers had been replaced at numerous gas stations without a permit. This was done by Interior Electric and their electrical administrator, Wayne Marvin.

When Inspector Steele contacted Wayne Marvin, his excuse was that he thought this was a like-in-kind replacement that did not need a permit. Inspector Steele then went ahead and issued the citations for failure to have -- to get an electrical permit prior to the installation.

And there was also a few other citations; one to Interior Electric for failure to ensure electrical installation were in strict conformity to the electrical statutes, rules, regulations, and ordinances. And then, also, there was one to Wayne Marvin, as the administrator, for his failure not to obtain a permit and to see that all the regulations were followed.

Now, the interesting part about this one is not so much the debate, but it went to a Hearing and the ALJ made numerous rulings. And what the Department is taking issue with is not the ruling, but with the ultimate conclusion from those.

Now, the ALJ did find that replacing these fuel dispensers was electrical work and required permit, and



the ALJ made such findings. The ALJ also found that replacing a fuel dispenser did not meet the exception to having a permit for a like-in-kind replacement.

Now, after making these findings, the ALJ then contemplated whether or not any permits that were obtained after the fact, after Mr. Steele had contacted Mr. Marvin, and he did obtain permits and have everything inspected; so all of those fuel dispensers were inspected.

But the question came, you know, can a work permit or an electrical permit that was obtained six to eight months after the actual work was done, is that timely? And for some reason, the ALJ, despite finding that the permit was required, decided that because Mr. Marvin obtained those permits after contact with Inspector Steele, that they were promptly -- once he found out that he needed a permit, he obtained a permit and got them inspected.

And somehow, under the ALJ's decision, that relieved him of any of these citations. You know, for the failure to get a permit in the first place. So that's essentially it in a nutshell, what took place.

And the Department's position is that if it was electrical work, as found by the ALJ, there was no exception as a like-in-kind replacement. There was no



permits pulled; and any permits that were, were late and would still be subject to citation, which the Department did. And there is not any good faith, "I didn't know that this was not like in-kind; I didn't know that this was a violation, therefore I should get excused."

You know, what that does is it opens the door for others to just simply claim ignorance. "I didn't know that this was a violation. And once I found out from the Department that it was, I quickly changed in the way I was practicing. Therefore, I should be excused from any type of penalty." That's essentially what they're asking for here.

And the Department thinks, and believes, that the ALJ was correct in its findings, but was not correct in its conclusion that no citation should be issued.

Are there any questions?

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Thank you very much.

Any questions from the Board? Yes?

BOARD MEMBER ALLEN: Board Member Allen.

So if I'm understanding your review correctly, there were -- there was the issue of whether it was an in-kind replacement. It was determined that it was not. It was the issue of whether it was required



1 permits, and that was determined that it was required. 2 But then there was the issue of "were the 3 permits late." Because after being told that they needed to have permits, the -- Mr. Marvin went out and 5 got the permits. 6 Is that, am I correct in my, kind of, review of that? 7 8 JOHN BARNES: Yes, you are correct. 9 BOARD MEMBER ALLEN: Okay. Would it, kind of, 10 seem like a catch-22 that I get penalized for getting a 11 late permit after I'm told that I need to get a permit 12 and I go ahead and get it. I mean, does that feel like 13 a catch-22? 14 No, it doesn't, because here's the JOHN BARNES: 15 thing. You need to get a permit for almost any type of 16 electrical installation. The same could be said for 17 anybody else that doesn't obtain a permit. And then 18 once told that they need one, goes out and gets it. 19 Mr. Marvin is the electrical administrator. He 20 should know the rules and regulations of the State. 21 And he should have known that this does not qualify as 22 the like-in-kind replacement. 23 BOARD MEMBER ALLEN: And if I could just follow 24 up on that. I don't disagree that he had to have 25 permits. I don't disagree with the findings that it



was not an in-kind replacement; that it did require permits.

I guess what I'm concerned about is that, once I'm told, "okay, you should've had the permits," and then I go ahead and get the permits, now, I get fined for getting a late permit. So it's a penalty for my cooperation on what was a violation. I'm just struggling with that. It just feels like a catch-22. I'm damned if I do and I'm damned if I don't. Do you know what I mean?

JOHN BARNES: Well, yeah, even if Mr. Marvin did not obtain those permits, he still would've been cited for, you know, one, for having a permit. And for, you know, at least, the electrical administrator not making sure everything is compliant with the rules and regulations. So those would've already been issued or were going to be issued to him.

And I'm assuming that if he went forward without having that permit, that eventually this Board would require that he did obtain one if he, you know, had not done that. So I don't see how, either way, I think the same citations are going to be issued.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: It looks like I've got a converse from our Secretary, Wayne Molesworth.

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: So, Wayne Molesworth,



Secretary of the Board. So 296-46B901(5), actually states: "Electrical work permit number on or adjacent to the electrical service or feeder panel supplying power to the work prior to beginning any electrical work, and at all times until the electrical inspection process is completed." So he was in violation of that law from beginning to end.

The problem is that the reason that's in place is because if he hadn't had a permit and requested inspection, the Department may never have looked at that installation, therefore putting the public at risk.

And so it's, kind of, like a speeding ticket.

If I am driving 80 miles an hour out here on the freeway, I'm going to get a ticket. Even though my intent is to slow down for the rest of my life, right.

And so that's how I would look at that law.

But the point is that it's actually very clear in the WAC when that permit is required to be purchased.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Board Member Knottingham?

BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: Yeah, Board Member

Knottingham. Just a couple things. One is, without
the permit being purchased, I don't believe there could
have been electrical inspection; is that correct?



JOHN BARNES: That is correct.

BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: So you wouldn't know, as Wayne stated, you wouldn't know if it was a safe installation or not until the permit is purchased; which causes the request, and then causes the inspection to happen.

The second one I wanted to point out, is that according to the inspector's statement -- and this is on the citation that ends in 1538, and in our packets on page 140 -- the inspector says that the permits hadn't been purchased for nine job sites until he requested additional information from "Brad." So there was some discussion.

And I haven't read every word of the document, but it appears that what triggered the purchase of the inspections wasn't the inspector saying he needed them; it was the fact that he was inquiring about work that had been done without an inspection.

JOHN BARNES: Correct.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Yes, Board Member.

BOARD MEMBER NORD: Board Member Nord. By law, Mr. Marvin is responsible as the administer to understand and implement that laws of the State of Washington concerning the proper installation of electrical equipment. That's what he is charged with





1	doing.
2	He obviously failed that charge. And failing
3	that charge, he put the public at risk by installing
4	fuel dispensers without inspection to ensure that
5	they've been installed properly, there were no
6	explosive reaction, or any danger to the public.
7	As a result of that, I believe the
8	Administrative Law Judge's opinion should be
9	overturned. The financial obligations of the citations
10	need to be followed up on, issued, and collected.
11	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Would that be a motion?
12	BOARD MEMBER NORD: That would be a motion.
13	BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: I'll second that
14	motion.
15	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Okay. So we have a
16	motion, to clarify, to overturn the ALJ's decision?
17	BOARD MEMBER NORD: Correct, or his
18	interpretation.
19	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: And affirm Department's
20	citations?
21	BOARD MEMBER NORD: And the financial
22	obligations of those citations to be collected.
23	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: We have a motion; we have
24	a second from
25	BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: Board Member



1	Knottingham.
2	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Any discussion?
3	Hearing none, all in favor of the motion,
4	signify by saying aye.
5	COLLECTIVE: "Aye."
6	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Any opposed?
7	The motion passes. All right. Thank you very
8	much. The Board has made its decision.
9	AAG BLOHOWIAK: Mr. Barnes, this is Ben
10	Blohowiak. Will you prepare an order reflecting the
11	Department or the Board's decision here today,
12	please?
13	JOHN BARNES:: Yes, sir.
14	AAG BLOHOWIAK: Thank you.
15	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: One second, please.

25	RANDY BARNES: Fantastic. Randy Barnes, tech Page 16



specialist for Wayne Molesworth.

First, I would start by thanking all of you that participated in the tech committee and reviewing the WAC proposals this year from the Electrical Board. It was quite a process for me. It was my first time, so it was very, very educational for me, and it was great to work with all of you.

So, saying that, we adopted the new WAC in NEC April 1st, which I'm sure all of you are aware of. And as of July 1st, we will have a fee due increase that was passed as well.

Our site, the laws and rules page has the current code as well as an exam-friendly. So the "exam-friendly," meaning the 2020 still. We will be updating the electrical exam anticipated late this year, possibly the first of next year.

So that's about what I have for you. Quick and short unless there are some questions.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Any questions by the Board?

Yes, Board Member Knottingham.

BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: Just to clarify, the exam-friendly version, is that the old version of the WAC?

RANDY BARNES: Correct, the 2020 version.



1	No?
2	LARRY VANCE: It's the latest and greatest.
3	RANDY BARNES: It's the latest and greatest.
4	BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: Okay.
5	RANDY BARNES: But it's formatted like the old
6	printed copies, right?
7	BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: Yeah.
8	RANDY BARNES: So you can put it in a PDF
9	version and print it. There's space for rings, that
10	kind of thing.
11	BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: So just the
12	formatting has changed, that's all.
13	RANDY BARNES: The formatting has, yep.
14	BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: Okay. Thank you.
15	BOARD MEMBER COX: Board Member Cox.
16	Clarification then, the exam-friendly is the previous
17	WAC for those who are needing to take exams
18	RANDY BARNES: The exam-friendly is the current
19	2023.
20	BOARD MEMBER COX: Okay. Got you.
21	RANDY BARNES: It's just formatted in an
22	exam-friendly version. It's got the table of contents;
23	it's got spacing. Rather than the version that's
24	available from the Code Reviser's page. Both of those

have links on our page, on our laws and rules page for



25

1	both.
2	BOARD MEMBER COX: And it's well documented so
3	those who are going to be taking the exam or otherwise
4	will know which one they need to study with? Is
5	that
6	RANDY BARNES: Do you want to jump in?
7	LARRY VANCE: I'll jump in.
8	RANDY BARNES: Sorry. Larry updated our web
9	page for the WAC rules and all of that
10	BOARD MEMBER COX: Very good.
11	LARRY VANCE: The current exam-friendly version
12	is nothing more than
13	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Can you introduce yourself
14	and spell your name for the court reporter?
15	LARRY VANCE: Yes, I'm Larry Vance. I'm a
16	technical specialist for the Department of Labor &
17	Industries. I work for the Electrical Program and the
18	Chief Electrical Inspector, Wayne Molesworth.
19	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Thank you.
20	LARRY VANCE: Okay. I'll jump in.
21	So the exam-friendly version is just something
22	we put out because of the formatting and extraneous
23	information that's included from the office of the Code
24	Reviser. There's a lot of things that have nothing to
25	do with the exam, that so you take 150-some pages



and you bring it down to 120, just for, from the standpoint of formatting, removing statutory reference information, just extraneous information that doesn't have anything for the exam candidate to -- there's just nothing there for them. It's just words on a page.

When we update the WAC, we make sure that we haven't done anything that alters the exam. So historically, you would be able to take about any version of the WAC, take the exam, and not be compromised in your ability to pass the exam.

The next time the exam is updated, we'll visit the WAC, and we'll likely, you know, maybe add some questions, maybe address some new things in the WAC. It's kind of nice to let a cycle go by, or a little bit of time go by, just so that the WAC stabilizes a little bit. Because there is things that we introduce into the rule that we learn about later that maybe we want to tweak. So we're not really trying to test exam candidates on some of the nuances of the WAC. It's more the foundational elements of the WAC.

So, if that -- and we've already updated the exam-friendly version twice. Potentially, we would've updated it three times, but this last update we were able to, just from a timing standpoint, have the new fee schedules. CR-103 had been signed, so we went



ahead and included the new fee schedules.

So we don't have to go through the exercise again, because it's actually quite a thing to do. We obtain a copy of the actual rule from the Office of the Code Reviser. We format it. And we go through and, it just takes a lot of work to get the document looking as good as it does. It's not -- you know, it's not a literary piece of work for, by any means.

But then we also have to work with the forms and records part of the Agency. I mean it's not something we can just switch, you know, update and post. We don't -- it doesn't work that way in a large organization. Forms and records, they have final say on the publication itself. And so it's an actual form. It's owned by the Department. And every time we update it, we have to go through this whole thing.

We should have the same version up until
we -- until another rulemaking happens. And we don't
have anything on the horizon. There was someone here
that approached the Board and talked about a rule
proposal last meeting, and we were able to work through
that issue without having to have a -- any rules
modified. There was somewhat of a misunderstanding
about the number of floors allowed, residential scope
of work and so on and so forth, and we were able to





just clarify some things and so the issue became moot.

Yeah.

So exam-friendly version, people are able to print that at any office supply store, their own place of business, or wherever they want to print it. But things happen so often in it, like I said, we've already updated it twice. And to print off a large number of copies or anything like that, it's just throwing -- it's like selling last years' calendars or something. I mean, it's just throw them away.

BOARD MEMBER COX: So just for my clarification, it is the current WAC as adopted through the CR-103 process --

LARRY VANCE: Yes.

BOARD MEMBER COX: -- and just simply formatted differently?

LARRY VANCE: Yeah. Yeah. And we have one comment on formatting is that we use the same, like, indent the first line half an inch. That's the same style as the Office of the Code Reviser and typing services. And we're going to change that. We're going to just left align everything. And it will reduce the number of pages.

And some people just don't like it when there's a sentence, kind of, hanging off over there to the



1	left. You know, it looks too "governmenty." So we're
2	going to probably change that a little bit next time.
3	But what we find, what's really helpful for
4	people is just having the table of contents. It's
5	something that's not provided by anything published,
6	the official versions. And the table of contents seems
7	to be really helpful for people.
8	BOARD MEMBER COX: Very good. Thank you.
9	LARRY VANCE: Yeah.
10	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Yes, Board Member Gray?
11	BOARD MEMBER GRAY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
12	Larry, what's the plan for updating the exam for
13	the NEC; is that going to be done in-house or is that
14	going to be done
15	LARRY VANCE: Well, I can defer to Wayne or I
16	can defer to Randy and Loren, who are more on the game
17	plan on that. But, typically, we do it in-house.
18	BOARD MEMBER GRAY: Okay. And the expectation,
19	if I heard you right, was early next year, next
20	calendar year?
21	RANDY BARNES: That would be what that's the
22	goal. Loren wants in here. Loren's already knee-deep
23	in reviewing.
24	LOREN LATHROP: Loren Lathrop, technical
25	specialist for the Department working for Wayne



Molesworth.

The exam is about 2600 questions. So, and then, another 50 to 60 code calculation questions that are in there. Typically, the last time we did this three years ago, it took about three to four months with one person working on it; then to be checked and everything else. It's, kind of, one of those things where when you dig through it, you find multiple things that were maybe missed the last time it was updated. Maybe it's a couple of code cycles back. You also have to move things around. So we're trying to give ourselves enough time to make sure that we put out the best product possible and give the best exam we can.

So it's going to take a little bit of time.

We've got the foundations built right now. Randy and I are working on a schedule to get it done. And our goal is, worst-case scenario, is the first of 2025. I really hope we're before that. But, you know, there's fires every once in a while and we have to switch priorities. But that's the goal at this point.

As well as updating some old questions that are, especially, as we talk about the WAC and the RCW, there's some older questions that are not as good as they could be. Maybe some updates there. Maybe adding some of the laws and the rules that have changed over



1 the last few cycles that we now can add. And as Larry 2 said, they have stabilized, so ... 3 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Comment. We're on the same mode of, once that things rolls over, the new 5 test, everyone is testing on the same test. We're not 6 doing the old testing, right? 7 LOREN LATHROP: Right. 8 LARRY VANCE: Yes. And, really, as far as the 9 exam being updated to the new code, you're really 10 looking at just, it's an incremental change. It's not 11 significant. If someone were to take a test right now 12 on the -- let's say they took a test on the 2002 13 National Electrical Code. How much would they -- how 14 much would they be missing out on, right. 15 It's not huge. There'd be some, potentially, 16 some AFCI issues, a few code changes, right. It's not 17 a significant thing. And the, you know, exams are 18 based on foundational elements. So chasing the 19 peripheral is not something that is the focus of the 20 exam, so ... 21 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Yeah, my comment was meant 22 simply because it makes more work for you all as far as 23 who is taking what exam --24 LARRY VANCE: Oh, absolutely. 25 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: -- it's nice for us to say



in this State, this is the new exam. And if you have to retest, we can (indiscernible) your code. So I'm liking it.

LARRY VANCE: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: And I'm glad that we're using less resources to do it.

LARRY VANCE: Yes. No, it's very good.

When we had the split exam, when you remained testing on the exam that you started on, that was interesting. The reports that the Board receives about statistic summaries, there was various versions of the exam that were on there, and it was a mess.

It's much easier to, just like you when we had -- we used to have a similar approach with the code. You know -- or with fees, excuse me. In other words, you stayed with the set of fees that you started with when you came to permit. Well, some permits are four or five years it takes to complete the work.

Well, there could be four of five fee increases during that time.

And so you're getting a -- you've added some item to your permit today, but you get the old rate. Well, it costs this much to do business today. So it's a matter of -- it's not that big a burden for somebody, again, because of the way that the exam is designed and



the fact that it's focus is foundational.

And we've never really had anybody complain about the fact that they were, they crossed a bridge, so to speak, in the exam process; that they went from one edition of the code to the other. Other than they had to possibly obtain a different book for the open book exam, so ...

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Thank you very much.

Secretary, did you have a question or a comment?

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH Yeah, Wayne Molesworth.

Just to, kind of, wrap that up and summarize.

Larry is exactly right. There's two different parts of qualifying for somebody to take an exam, right. You have skills, which they learn in OJT, and then you have an exam.

To me, the skills and abilities that they have working are even more important. And we're working on some things like that. Whereas the knowledge is, since this is an open book test, this allows us to know that they know how to use the code book and that they can find specific information. So whether it's updated or not, they're still allowed and able to use that code book. We still know that they are capable.

When we talk about minimizing it, that there's very few changes, that doesn't mean we don't look at



every single question, right. We have to, to make sure that everything coordinates and is complete.

And like the techs have said, we find things.

And I really commend them for that. These guys are
working their butts off. We have one other individual
who is a trainer, who I think is helping at some point
and may be helping a little bit more once I talk to
him. But I give the guys probably an insurmountable
goal, which was I wanted it done by, if not before, the
first of 2025, because we're already a year behind 2023
code, right.

And that's something that I think, and I hope going forward we can remedy and have our codes adopted in relationship, or closer in relationship, to when the code is actually printed, right. That can and can't happen because rule changes take a long time and you have a very long process. So we just may look at it a little bit differently in the future.

That was really all I was going to say, is that's it's a very thorough process. And like Larry mentioned, we're just looking at whether or not they know some of these things and know that they can use that code book to find what they need to find.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Thank you very much.

Anymore comments or questions from the Board?



All right, well, thank you.

Looks like we're up to -- Larry, if you want to stay there. It looks like we've got Certification/CEU quarterly report from Technical Specialist, Larry Vance.

*** Certification/CEU Quarterly Report ***

LARRY VANCE: Yes. With the Board packet there were several exams that were sent out. One of them was the, essentially, the exam results from, based on national testing locations. So it's, again, very apparent that people are able to take exams all over the United States, and that our system of examination is very accessible. People don't have to come to Washington to wait -- to come to Washington to take an exam. They can get certified before even coming. And that's something that's very advantageous, that PSI offers.

As far as the exam reports, we have a report that is -- let's see, it's from -- it's last year. It's from January 1st of 2023 until December 31st of '23. So it's a years worth of data. It's about four months old. But no real -- no significant changes in the exam pass rates.

I can tell you just off -- and this is just coming off of the top of my head -- that there is an



increase in the number of apprentices that are registered now. The area that -- the number of training agents again has increased. The training agents, of course, are the employers that employee apprentices. And the number of apprentices is up by probably 1000 or so. It's real hard, because there is also apprentices completing, and new apprentices entering the registration system. So that's kind of a moving target.

But it will be interesting over time to see if we distance ourselves a little bit from the current pass rate, which is about 50 percent first time pass rate.

And, one other thing, I've mentioned before is that not everybody that's taking the exam is someone that has just completed their training. A lot of people that take the exam are people that are coming from other states, that are just, that qualified through experience and training to take the exam.

So they may not have attempted an exam for a number of years when they take the exam. So they may be a little rusty and that may affect the pass rate. So we'll never completely know, but it will be interesting to see if it moves a little bit.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: In our last meeting we had



some little things that were -- little hiccups that were happening in the system.

Have you heard anything, updates on that, any changes?

LARRY VANCE: Yeah. Yeah. When I went to run this -- so this data here is four months old. And when I went to run the report, the current year's worth of data, there was a -- it wasn't coming back. And they had data issues on two days, and they were working on cleaning those data issues up, which would allow the report to function.

PSI has been obtained by the -- I believe they've been acquired by one of the, I believe, the world's largest testing companies now. So I'm not privy to their, to, you know, if that's had any effect on them or anything.

We did have a Board Member Knottingham had asked about a particular individual and I worked with that individual. And there have been some computer issues with PSI exam partner sites -- partner sites.

So there's brick and mortar PSI sites, meaning that PSI is one that PSI staffed, PSI employees, and there are what's known as partner sites. Partner sites are like the college in Tacoma, the Airport Inn. I believe, Puyallup -- there is a number of what's known

as PSI partner sites. The majority, I believe, of PSI
exams are delivered at partner sites. So you're using
the PSI partner sites computer infrastructure.

And this particular individual, what happened
with his result was is that it lived in the partner
site's computer on the hard drive. PSI had no record
of it, through whatever, you know, did the record not

send, you know, was there a glitch, or whatever happened. But the individual was able to go to the testing site and say, "hey, can I have my exam results." It happened to be an administrator exam.

They found them. They printed them. And we're good.

"Can I have my exam results? Can you find those."

It was a great inconvenience, but we're working through some of those issues. And they've dropped off is the other thing. We had a rash of them, and we -- we're not experiencing what we experienced previously.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: That was kind of my question. So still seeing those --

LARRY VANCE: No.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: -- or has it cleared up.

So it sounds like --

LARRY VANCE: No, we did have a computer where a person was partway through their exam. And I don't

I just had a question about the information, such as this. And how we share that information with, you know, the electricians of the state as a whole. I know that what we're hearing in here, and oftentimes I hear things like, "Oh, is the Board discussing that? I just looked at the website."

It appears that we don't post the Agenda or some of these other attachments or addendums that we've discussed here either in the transcript, because, you know, play by play of what's communicated, but some of the other ancillary documents, I can't go back in history and see, kind of, that information.

Can we generally share that type of stuff or is that only privy information that comes here to the Board?

LARRY VANCE: Once we produce a report, it becomes public information. And there are several people that will request a copy. For instance, exam reports. Just based on their knowledge that they're discussed every month. So they are available, and we do keep them. Anything that the Board is presented. In other words, the Board package that goes out, that is something that is stored and we have record of if we ever need to replicate the information.

So if anybody needs a copy, I mean, you can disseminate this information. This is public information, yeah.

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: Wayne Molesworth. A of times there is a limited space on our website and space on our webs

of times there is a limited space on our website and that type of thing, so we have to prioritize. What is the best value to put on that website that people will use the most.

We've even gone as far as having what they call a heat test, where we can see how many times they've accessed certain parts of the website. And so we just did that a few years back, and eliminated some of the different types of stuff that got one or two hits, right, over a year.

But that's one of the reasons we don't necessarily put in there. They can call us up or ask for a records request for just about anything we have, such as anything from this meeting.

BOARD MEMBER TUMELSON: Thank you.

LARRY VANCE: Yes, and I was involved in that process. And the, kind of the mantra was it is not a reference center. It's a place to convey information, just essentially the high points. And direct someone to where, you know, I guess if you looked at, you know, I guess, if you looked at, you know, there is, kind of,





there's an approach that's called bite; snack; meal.

So there is a little bite, or the snack and essentially sends you the meal. And in the world of probably, the Board, you've got the agenda and then the Board minutes would be the meal. But, you know, if you want to read the whole Board minutes, there they are. And if you see something mentioned in the minutes that you want to know more about, then you contact the Department, and say, "hey, I'd like a copy of this."

And you can do that through public information request.

We get a lot of public information requests. So it's something we have staff member that's, at least, that's a good half of their job is public information requests. Just gathering information and pushing it out the door. "I want to know this." Great, here you go.

BOARD MEMBER TUMELSON: And I'm glad you mentioned that, because the "bite" doesn't exist on the website, right. There is no agenda, that I can find when you go to the meeting minutes, like, what's going to be discussed. And so it just goes to the entire minutes, all of the transcript stuff, and so.

LARRY VANCE: Yeah, the agenda should be posted there for the current Board meeting. It should be there online. It should have the agenda. It's usually



1	included right there with the location.

So we are on item, Agenda Item No. 6. And from the Secretary of the Board, we are here for your report.

*** Secretary's Report ***

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: All right. Thank you,
Board members. Wayne Molesworth, Secretary of the
Board. I'll now read the Secretary's Report into the
record.

Budget: The electrical fund balance on March 31st, 2024, was \$13,490,224, which is about five times the average monthly operating expenditures. The average monthly operating expenditures for the third quarter of the fiscal year, 2024, were \$2,955,424, compared to \$2,486,725 for the same period last year. This is an increase of 19 percent.

Average monthly revenue for the third quarter of FY24 was \$2,740,511, compared to \$2,670,388 for the same period last year. An increase of about three percent.

March 1st, 2024, customer service, we had 41,785 permits were sold last quarter. 98.5 percent, or 41,157, were processed online, which is an increase of .2 percent from the last quarter. 99.6 percent of contractor permits were sold online, which is an



increase of 11.8 percent from the previous quarter.

Homeowners online sales for this quarter is 84.3 percent, which is a 1 percent increase for the previous quarter. Online inspection requests were 76.4 percent, which is a .5 percent increase from last quarter. During this quarter, customers made 90.7 percent of all electrical license renewals online, which is a .1 percent decrease from last quarter.

Key performance measures: Percent of inspections performed within 24 hours of request. The goal is 86 percent. In FY23, we had 78 percent. The same period this fiscal year, '24, was 79 percent.

Percent of inspections performed within 48 hours of request. 90 percent, last year. 90 percent this year. A total of inspections performed: Fiscal year 2023 was 62,907. Same period this year, 61,362.

Virtual electrical inspections, VEI performed: 10,344 last year at this time, currently 10,830.

Number of focused citations and warnings contractor licensing, worker certification, no permit, failing to supervise trainees; the anticipated number is 4136. In the field in fiscal year '23, we had 263 done in the field. And for ECORE /Audit we had 1,085, for a total of 1348. This same period, this year, the field was 576. ECORE/Audit were 3672, for a total of 428.



Inspection stops per inspector per day. Last year at this period, 10.9. Same period of time for fiscal year '24, 10.7.

Serious electrical collections that would result in disconnection. In 2023, it was 8573. In 2024, it was 8966. Turnaround time for average plan set reviewed. Last year at this time was one day. This year it's gone to four days. Plan review pages, 400 last year at this timeframe. And reviewed this current FY 2024 time period was 1377. That explains the four days.

So percentage of warnings by focused violation type, licensing was 2 percent, certification 10, no permit 28 percent, trainee supervision 22 percent, and all other focused, 4 percent.

Electrical licensing citations and amusement rides and appeals. As of April 3rd, 2024, there are approximately 1,020 items waiting to be processed by the licensing team. That includes affidavits, electrical licenses, renewals, that type of document.

The oldest item is dated February 6, 2024.

About 870 of these items are affidavits needing to be processed. This is about double the amount of documents waiting to be processed for what was reported in January's Board meeting.



In addition to processing documents, licensing staff are responsible for answering all incoming licensing phone calls. For the timeframe between January 1, 2024, and March 31st, 2024, they received 6,499 calls through the licensing phone line. This is approximately a 13 percent increase from last quarter. During the quarter, an average of 2,166 calls came in per month, which is about 542 per week, 108 per day, and 13.50 per hour. This does not include inbound calls on their direct lines or outbound calls made to customers.

There are currently three vacant positions within the licensing team and licensing supervisor position is vacant. We just got approval to recruit for all the licensing positions except for the licensing supervisor.

Due to the current licensing vacancies, staff from the citations team have been assisting the licensing team, and this is impacting citations workload. The citations team have been current on mailing out citations letters to violators, however a backlog is beginning. Also, there is a significant backlog of outstanding debt needing to be sent to the external collections agency.

I'm going to add a little bit to that. We have





received help from the rest of the Agency, from other programs, to assist in transferring that debt to an outside collections agency to bring us back into compliance. That has yet to be done, but that workload was done by citations and reduced by about half over the last few months. So they've done a good job of trying to keep on board.

Testing lab report: 1 new lab, NSS Laboratories
Incorporated was approved to be a testing lab, or one
of our accredited testing labs.

Next section is Passed legislation. As you guys are probably aware, we made some changes to the inspector qualifications. In order for the legislature to actually pass that particular legislation, they wanted us to go into meetings with the AWC, Association of Washington Cities, to determine whether or not there were additional pathways for electrical inspectors to be hired, right, to qualify to be electrical inspectors. We started those conversations. We hopefully will be able to supply the legislature with a report in December.

The qualifications that we actually removed, if you're not aware, were those that pertain to engineering experience. You had, whether or not you attended two years of engineering school and then two



years -- or four years of experience. Or you attended four years of engineering school and had two years of experience in the electrical trade.

What those qualifications didn't determine is whether or not you passed the classes, and -- and whether or not you gained experience in qualifying areas. If you didn't pass the classes, and you had two years of experience, you'd be a trainee, and you may have been working in the assigned {sic} industry. And then you would qualify to become an electrical inspector. That was not in the best interest of the citizens of Washington, and so we removed it.

Other program updates: I have a couple here for you, the reconsideration process which we introduced to you at last board meeting and the board meeting before, reconsiders only those hours that are denied on affidavits for trainees that are trying to qualify for exam.

We've set up and started the process April 1st.

We actually have not received any request for qualifying re-assumptions. Looking at their hours again, we made the decision to start those re-assumptions from April 1st. And so we had to draw a line in the sand someplace.

The only people that have actually applied for



re-assumptions were from before April 1st, and were because they violated the 180-day rule. In the re-assumptions, if they violated the law, and that's their excuse for wanting re-assumption or their justification for re-assumption, we don't approve those if they're in violation of an RCW or a WAC. That was a decision that was made by management as well as the Chief.

But, we've implemented it and it's on its way. We'll see how it turns out. Hopefully, it will give people an avenue that maybe we didn't look at everything possible, or maybe they didn't supply us with everything they should've, giving us that opportunity to take a look at their hours once again.

One other thing that a little bit of sad news that I'll share with you, because I think the family has made it common knowledge. Brian Stenerson, the supervisor of the VEI team passed away last Friday. And so it was kind of sudden, nobody was aware. And so we send all of our condolences to his family and putting forth a -- putting together a little Fund Me for his family because it happened so suddenly.

We are in the process of putting together recruitment for a new supervisor and a have somebody in that position in an interim position, so to continue



1	the process with VEI.

17	earlier, is what
18	SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: We had some big citations
19	included in this year, and so so the number.
20	CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Thank you. Board member?
21	BOARD MEMBER COX: Board Member Cox, that was my
22	question also on performance No. 5 to give a brief
23	summary of accounting of how we got a 300 percent
24	increase in the year?
25	SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: Yeah, so we had some



large citations. I see Phil has left. He probably explains them better. But large citations with multiple locations from out-of-state contractors and in-state unlicensed contractors. So they make up quite a large number of citations, when you're looking.

I think we had one -- one group of citations that probably had around 200 instances, right. And so because of the documentation on the citation, we decided to site them appropriately, right. And so it raised the number of citations that we actually issued.

BOARD MEMBER COX: So it wasn't that we had more staff to do more work; it was we had an incident or incidents that were large?

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: Right, exactly. So that brings me to a point that I would like to make in addition, is that one of the -- one of the asks I have for this next budget cycle will be for additional compliance inspectors. I am working on additional agreements with other cities, still trying to identify those cities, that we have with the City of Seattle. Where they have one individual that writes, or that identifies compliance, pulls together the evidence package, and then our ECORE team actually submits that citation.

And that will take more, as well as the question



was asked to me, well, "how do you know many compliance inspectors you need?" We don't. Compliance is an invisible problem, right. You don't see it until you see it. And so as you can see from the goals that ECORE has had, they've had the same number of people for quite some time.

We raised their goal to I think it was right around 3,000, and they meet that every time. And so, because they meet that every time, my justification is there's more, right.

And so, you know, I would look for advice if you guys think, if the Board thinks that's a position we should take, that we should move towards. But that's it's my opinion that it's just as important as making sure licensed contractors are installing the work.

Well, it is a part of compliance.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: I think that's a pretty common throughout the Board that we're concerned with making sure compliance is taking care of. And if anybody is an argument against it, that's our position also.

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: It will limit our ability to have additional inspectors, but the reports that we're pulling together now show that our inspectors are becoming more efficient. And I'll try to put together



a little bit of a data dump for you next meeting to show you where we've gone. Over the last six months, we've reduced overtime and still accomplishing as much work. Because of different processes that we've put in place, so.

So I think we can ask for more staff for an

So I think we can ask for more staff for an ECORE position, rather than inspectors as well is what I'm looking at. I know that won't be favorable in the program. I'll probably hit some rough patches. But that's the way it goes.

CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Anymore questions from the Board?

BOARD MEMBER ALLEN: Board Member Allen. Would it be helpful to have any kind of letter from this Board to support, in support of your request for additional staff?

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: I'd definitely appreciate that. A letter in support always helps us to help management understand the work we do, and what that looks like. Whether or not we can do that. And it looks like they're working on it right now. He's probably going to make it into a plane and throw it to me. Just kidding.

But the problem we run into with budget packages is they have to be approved by the most upper

1	management, Joel Sacks, and his deputy directors. And
2	sometimes they don't understand the work, and the
3	reason for the work. They look at "well, are

BOARD MEMBER COX: Discussion. Question on your virtual electrical inspection.

Are you appropriately staffed in the VEI?

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: So we're not. VEI comes
from within, within the program, because it takes a

real experienced person to be able to tell somebody where to point their camera, right.

BOARD MEMBER COX: Right.

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: So when we take staff away from the field, we have to make sure they can still cover the inspection load that they have. And so that's another angle that we're probably going to take is that to grow VEI we need to also fill those vacancies, and ask specifically for positions for VEI. And that will give us the ability to also fill those vacancies that we create when we hire VEI inspectors.

BOARD MEMBER COX: So is that in conjunction with your need for ECORE "ask"?

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: It will be at the same time. It's two different issues, right. And the reason -- I'm just you asked that question -- is the reason for that is we need to develop different programs inside of VEI, such as solar voltaic inspections, right, not on your sunglasses.

But so that we're not putting our inspectors in hazards on roofs and that type of thing, right. If we can look at them with VEI, then we're ahead of the game. We haven't got there yet. So we need additional staff, because that will be a very large workload when it does come in. And we may make a separate little





1 unit just for that type of work and EV chargers and the 2 such. BOARD MEMBER COX: Right. And so to the point 3 of Board Member Allen's motion, you know, are we giving 5 a general letter of support for hiring staff where 6 needed, which was the reason for my question for VEI; is it all of it, or is it just because it sounds like 7 8 the Chief is going to have an ask for each of the 9 programs, VEI, ECORE, separately. So I'm assuming our 10 letter would then support any necessary. 11 BOARD MEMBER ALLEN: That was my intent. 12 BOARD MEMBER COX: Very good. 13 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Second? 14 BOARD MEMBER NORD: Yes. 15 SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: And I appreciate that. 16 What I would ask is a little bit more focus in the 17 letter and some reasoning from the Board on supporting 18 compliance staff. Otherwise, they might lump it all 19 together again, right? "We'll what did they mean? Well, what does the Board mean by this?" So we want to 20 21 be a little bit more specific. 22 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: So what you're looking for 23 is maybe a motion on adding staff members to 24 compliance? 25 AAG BLOHOWIAK: I think your motion as it is, is



1 appropriate and gives us plenty of wiggle room to 2 massage the language. 3 Wayne, when is -- when are you doing your funding request? I need a deadline. SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: So it's really already 5 6 started. But, so I would say if I was to get a letter by the middle or the end of May it would probably be 7 8 sufficient. But the sooner the better. 9 AAG BLOHOWIAK: Okay. 10 UNKNOWN BOARD MEMBER: Next week okay for you? 11 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Board Member Cox? 12 BOARD MEMBER COX: So in addition to that 13 question on Counsel's point, how would the Board go 14 about approving the letter that gets crafted? 15 AAG BLOHOWIAK: The Board has already, well, 16 there's a motion on the table to send a letter. 17 the official action, the Board is going to send the 18 letter. I can circulate drafts via email for 19 everybody's approval. I don't see any, the actual, 20 like, it's clear what the Board's intent is and you're 21 going to vote on that. The actual form of it, I think 22 we have flexibility off the record to take care of 23 that. 24 BOARD MEMBER COX: Very good. 25 BOARD MEMBER NORD: The chair --

18	SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: Yeah, unfortunately, I'm
19	looking to create that flexibility and that push.
20	Because what we've got right now is the law says that
21	the Director has oversight over the Electrical Chief.
22	There's been quite a bit of, not oversight, but
23	actual direction coming from lower levels under
24	Director, right. And he's got the option to delegate
25	his responsibilities to maybe an assistant director.



1 But we're -- because we have a matrix system with field 2 and other places, they are lumping us together with who 3 gets what, and they make the decision. I don't get to make the decision lately. Which ... 4 BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: 5 Is a problem. 6 SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: Is a problem. And, but it's a problem I'm trying to remedy 7 8 through getting more credibility and that, but it's 9 still a problem. And so that's what I'm looking for is 10 to regain some of that with support from the Board to 11 be able to say where those positions belong. 12 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Anymore discussions on the 13 motion? Hearing none, all in favor say, aye. 14 "Aye." COLLECTIVE: 15 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Any opposed? 16 The motion passes. Thank you. 17 Thank you. SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: 18 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Anything else, questions? 19 BOARD MEMBER TUMELSON: I have just a question. 20 Board Member Tumelson. Thank you for, you know, kind 21 of, the awareness of, kind of, diving into the pathways 22 of becoming an electrical inspector. I know that 23 that's been a focus of, you know, some of the cities 24 that also struggle to find electrical inspectors. 25 And so I know that the Department struggled with



that over the years, as well. And so, you know, just an extra focus on what type of pathways do exist and which ones are appropriate and which ones aren't. And I appreciate the Department kind of taking a deep-dive on that. And also the underground economy, yeah, that's, you know, that's a very different one to, kind of, you know, identify how much attention is needed. And so I appreciate the Department's effort on that.

Along those lines though, you mentioned EV. I did just want to just touch briefly, I know it's not inside of the scope of, you know, statutory authority, but there has been additional, significant changes to the requirements in the International Building Code, and the International Residential Code and so just wanted to, you know, give the Department a heads-up on that.

Every new single-family is going to have EV in the garage. And then commercial buildings has expanded greatly to the requirements for electrical vehicle charging. And so your guys should be seeing a lot more of that coming in with this next code cycle. And so, which was also adopted March 15th of this year, so be on the lookout.

SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: Yeah, and appreciate that, Jim.



1 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Board Member Knottingham? 2 BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: Wayne, is there 3 anything the Board can do. You mentioned the matrix issue and, you know, I understand why that came about and when it came about. 5 6 Is there anything the Board can do to support, 7 directly support getting more oversight over the 8 individual regions? SECRETARY MOLESWORTH: You know, I've not 9 10 thought a lot about that avenue. So maybe we revisit 11 that next meeting and I'll give that some thought and 12 see what kind of options we might have. 13 I have to be very careful, because in my PDF it 14 talks about creating relationships and working together 15 with regional administrators in the -- in the regions 16 that actually supervise electrical staff. And so I try 17 to do that the best I can. And staying within that is 18 important to me, because that's what my boss's telling 19 me to do. 20 At the same time I think there is probably 21 avenues to where we can effect and be part of their 22 decision-making process a little bit better. So let me 23 think about that. 24 BOARD MEMBER KNOTTINGHAM: Thank you. 25 CHAIRPERSON JENKINS: Any more questions for the
