But off the top of 7 my head, that's -- I'm not entirely sure the board has 8 9 the ability to expand its membership on the fly like 10 that without -- at least without the director of the 11 Department of Labor and Industries being involved. 12 And I think --MELISSA McBRIDE: 13 AAG BEN BLOHOWIAK: I will continue to look 14 into it. 15 MELISSA McBRIDE: Thanks, Ben. 16 And I think the question that will come into play is the members of the board are identified in statute. 17 18 And it says "a representative from the Department of 19 Health." So we just want to know if "a" has to be singular or if that means it can be a shared seat. 20 21 And if that's something that the Department's 22 counsel needs to look into instead, we're happy to do 23 that, as well. 24 AAG BEN BLOHOWIAK: Okay. Well, I'll talk

with them, and we'll get an answer.

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1 MELISSA McBRIDE: Thank you. 2 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: For the purposes of today for any votes, Ben, we would have Allan? Because he's 3 the identified seat, he would be the vote for that 4 chair, correct? 5 6 AAG BEN BLOHOWIAK: If he has been -- yes. If he's been appointed to the board, yes. 7 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Okay. So, you guys 8 9 sharing the seat there, you're together but one vote. 10 JOE BARBEE: No worries. 11 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: All right. Very good. Thank you for that clarification, Ben. 12 13 Melissa, you're up with plumbing program activity 14 overview. 15 MELISSA McBRIDE: Okay. So, I think there's 16 in the packet -- I think I heard Alisha say the number 17 of plumbers that's in here. 18 And I'm going to give you numbers, and those 19 numbers might be a little bit different. But the 20 numbers are a current snapshot. So, I took a snapshot 21 from yesterday. So, they're always changing whether 22 it's from an expiration or a suspension or renewal. 23 So, the numbers are fluid. But as of yesterday we have 1,781 active plumbing 24 contractors; 6,773 plumbers, and that's all plumber 25

2	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: What's that number?
3	MELISSA McBRIDE: 6,773.
4	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: That's all plumber types?
5	MELISSA McBRIDE: All plumber types.
6	Sorry.
7	Not trainees. Trainees would be separate.
8	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Okay.
9	MELISSA McBRIDE: The domestic well's going
10	to be within there. So, it's broken down differently
11	here.
12	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Okay. Okay.
13	MELISSA McBRIDE: And, then, trainees is
14	5,608. And so, you can see here it's 5,601 in the
15	handout. So it's just somebody's expired or
16	suspended in that timeframe.
17	Not suspended but expired.
18	And for job-site visits for the last quarter, our
19	construction compliance inspectors visited 2,902
20	jobsites. And that's all types of jobsites, whether
21	it's plumbing residential or commercial, construction,
22	electrical.
23	Did you have a question?
24	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: That's in the quarter?
25	Last quarter?



1 MELISSA McBRIDE: Yes. Yes. 2 And, then, the infractions are in your handout 3 here. There was 200 . . . 221 infractions were issued for the quarter. 4 And if you look at the handout, if the -- if a 5 6 business is identified, that's a plumbing-contractor infraction. If it's an individual, it's going to be 7 supervision or trainee. 8 And it also provides the status here, whether 9 10 they're still at a Pending First Letter, which means that it's within their appeal period so they're not 11 final; Issued, have just been sent out; Closed Paid in 12 13 Full, Closed Paid in Full. 14 Pending Second Letter is when the appeal period 15 has passed and they did not appeal, so the infraction 16 is final. The money's owed but has not been paid. that Pending Second Letter status that you see in there 17 18 says, "You owe this money. If you don't pay, you're 19 going to be sent on to collection measures."

So, that's kind of an overview, really, of the activity that's been going on. I wanted to provide you a drill-down of some more numbers. But unfortunately our data system -- I got the numbers this morning from IT, and things aren't adding up, so I --

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1 MELISSA McBRIDE: Is that this? 2 Oh, okay. I thought it was this thing back No. 3 here behind me. So, I -- I need to dive into the IT system and 4 5 find out why those numbers aren't adding up. 6 So, with the activity, that's all I'm going to 7 report on that. For the program overview, I do want to mention 8 Jesse Jameson, where -- I don't know if -- I think a 9 10 lot of you have probably interacted with Jesse Jameson, who is the technical specialist for the program. 11 12 passed away December 1st. He was a great asset to 13 the program: commitment to customer service, always available by phone, so smart. It's been a big hit to 14 15 lose Jesse. It was very unexpected. He was our technical specialist. I think 2012 is 16 when they interviewed him for that job. 17 18 And before then he was a compliance inspector. 19 actually kind of paved the way for Internet compliance, where, you know, craigslist was just becoming a thing. 20 21 And Jesse really realized the underground activity and 22 illegal actions going on on craigslist. And he really 23 developed that for our team. 24 So, I just wanted to take a moment and acknowledge Jesse and share that. And it's a big loss to the 25



1 program. So . . . 2 If you want to say anything. CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yeah. I do. 3 I mean, I liked Jesse. I had a lot of respect for him. He went out of his way to help -- help people. 5 6 He really did. In many ways he helped in the industry. 7 And, you know, he -- I know he authored some 8 documents that are pretty good. These tales -- he told 9 10 a story to talk about compliance and taking the law and 11 putting it into a story form. I tried to find those on the L&I website, but I could not. 12 13 MELISSA McBRIDE: Okay. 14 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Is there any way we can get access to those writings? 15 16 MELISSA McBRIDE: Yeah. The compliance tales, yes, we have them internal. And he would send 17 18 those out. And he had a huge distribution list of 19 external stakeholders that he sent it to, as well. And I don't know -- I don't have everybody that he sent 20 21 them to. But what he has written, I can definitely 22 share those, and we can provide that. I can see even 23 about putting them on the Internet. 24 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: I think to get that on 25 the website would be really great. Offers clarity for



1 people. 2 MELISSA McBRIDE: I think so, too. So let me look into that. 3 Communication type will continue. It certainly won't be in the format and the way Jesse did it. 5 6 I have not recruited for that position. I don't know when I will be able to do that. 7 So, I think that that communication is something 8 9 that I'm going to take over in the meantime. 10 know what it's going to look like. But there will be 11 more coming on that. But I don't want to derail from what you were 12 13 saying about Jesse. 14 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: No. I just -- total 15 respect for him. Glad he was part of the program. Ι 16 thought he brought a lot to the table. And I'm sorry 17 to see that he's gone. 18 MELISSA McBRIDE: Thank you. 19 And he and Bruce worked together, obviously, for 20 many, many years. 21 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yeah. 22 MELISSA McBRIDE: Bruce, plumber. Plumbers 23 in the room here. Jesse was an electrician. So those 24 two in a meeting together, going on, battling back and 25 forth between electricians and plumbers, was -- I will



miss those little arguments, so . . . 1 2 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yeah. All right. Anybody else want to have anything to offer on 3 this topic? 4 5 MIKE KUNKEL: Mr. Chairman. 6 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: I will say, working with Jesse, 7 MIKE KUNKEL: he was always -- even though he knew he was getting 8 9 ready for retirement, he was always looking out for the 10 best interests of people that came behind him. And 11 that was the program, but it was also the people that 12 were taking his spot. He wanted to give them as much 13 information as he could. So, again, he was just a 14 selfless -- you know, he was -- looked out for 15 everybody. 16 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Thank you. 17 Steve. 18 STEVE NASTRUZ: Yeah. I met Jesse, like, 19 long time ago, early 2000s when he was a compliance officer. And, yeah, he -- he was -- he was -- he --20 21 looking at him, he could be intimidating. But, you 22 know, he was very composed and very professional in 23 dealing with compliance infractions. 24 And he was always reliable to call and say, "Hey,

I've got this thing going on at this job." And he



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1	would respond in a timely manner. And he did an
2	excellent job of resolving the issues.
3	So, yeah, that's a sad loss that he passed on.
4	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Thank you, Steve.
5	JED SCHEUERMANN: Yeah, he had heart and soul
6	combined with professionalism. It was a rare
7	combination for a government bureaucrat.
8	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: That's a good way to put
9	it, that he had heart and soul combined with
10	professionalism.
11	All right. Well, very good.
12	MELISSA McBRIDE: That's wrapping it up for
13	me.
14	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: That's wrapping it up for
15	you on that? Okay.
16	MELISSA McBRIDE: Oh, but I'm on the next.
17	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Plumber exams. You're
18	going to fill us in on plumber exams.
19	MELISSA McBRIDE: Yeah. So, let's switch
20	back.
21	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Is this a result of the
22	vote from the last meeting, the board motion?
23	MELISSA McBRIDE: I don't remember what the
24	motion was. I'd have to look back in the notes.
25	I think we were going to wait and see, right,

1 what's happening in March? 2 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: No. There was a resolution coming out of the board to -- it was -- it 3 was to ask L&I to bring testing up to the 2020 -- the 4 state -- whatever code the State Building Code Council 5 6 has adopted for that period --7 MELISSA McBRIDE: Yes. CHAIR TODD ALLRED: -- that we test under 8 9 that code 'cause currently we're testing under 2015 10 code. 11 MELISSA McBRIDE: Right. CHAIR TODD ALLRED: And we're into 20 -- the 12 13 State has adopted the 2018 code currently. But then on 14 March 15th we go to the '21 code. But we're still 15 testing on '15. MELISSA McBRIDE: So, what we're going to do 16 is wait until that March date and make sure that the 17 18 code gets adopted. And then we're going to write the 19 exam to that code. We don't want to jump and start writing the exam to the 2019 code when it's possibly 20 21 changing in just a few months. 22 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yeah. 23 MELISSA McBRIDE: And from what I've heard, 24 it sounds like it will be adopted. I don't know 'cause it hasn't is a few times. But at this point our plan 25



1	is that it will be adopted in March, and we will start
2	writing the exam to that code.
3	In addition to that, the version is also available
4	in Spanish. Correct? That
5	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: The test?
6	MELISSA McBRIDE: Yeah.
7	No. No. No. The new code. There's a Spanish
8	version of the 2021 code, and so we will also be
9	providing the writing the exam in Spanish, as well.
10	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Oh.
11	MELISSA McBRIDE: Since the code will be in
12	Spanish, we're going to go ahead and give the exam in
13	Spanish.
14	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Okay. Jed, how many
15	languages do you guys publish the UPC?
16	JED SCHEUERMANN: I believe we publish in
17	Spanish, in Hindi, in Vietnamese. And I'm not sure
18	what we do in the Philippines. I'm not sure what we do
19	in the Middle East. I'd have to get a number. I'd
20	have to get back to you. I will do that.
21	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yeah. No. That's great
22	'cause I think there's a lot of Spanish-speaking folks
23	that are that gives them opportunity to test.
24	JED SCHEUERMANN: We do it in Spanish. That
25	is for certain.



1 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: She's saying that they're 2 gonna -- the next test they develop after the 2021 code 3 is adopted is to have the test in Spanish, as well. Jed, do you know, is everything set to move 4 forward with State Building Code Council to have the 5 6 2021 UPC adopted? JED SCHEUERMANN: I'm going to attend the 7 State Building Code Council meeting on Friday, coming 8 9 Friday. And hopefully I'll hear more then. At last 10 word, it was in March. But what happens on Friday is 11 anyone's guess --12 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Okay. 13 JED SCHEUERMANN: -- at this point because 14 there have been some significant changes at the State 15 Building Code Council with people stepping down. and I just learned that last week. So I'll find out on 16 17 Friday. 18 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Okay. All right. 19 you let us --JED SCHEUERMANN: If any of you have the 20 21 opportunity, it's at the DES building in Olympia on 22 Friday from 10:00 until 4:00. I will be there at that 23 meeting 'cause I want to know what's going on at the 24 State Building Code Council.

CHAIR TODD ALLRED: 10:00 till 4:00?

1	JED SCHEUERMANN: 10:00 till 4:00 is what

4	that committee yet?
5	JED SCHEUERMANN: Nope. Not at this moment.

8	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Okay. Yeah. I think
9	that I think that's important for the industry and
10	for the public that there is representation of our
11	industry on the State Building Code Council since
12	there's codes that are adopted that rule on oversee
13	our industry.
14	I think that that's super important.
15	I don't know what this board can do about that,
16	but we should have representation on that board,
17	100 percent.
18	JED SCHEUERMANN: The meeting is at the DES
19	building, Room 1213, 1500 Jefferson Street Southeast in
20	Olympia. And it's scheduled from 10:00 a.m. till
21	4:00 p.m.
22	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Which suite did you say?
23	JED SCHEUERMANN: 1213.
24	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Thank you, Jed.
25	Okay. So, depending on what I hear you're

2	Council does, if it gets when it gets adopted, then
3	you'll start writing the test for the 2021 adopted
4	code?
5	MELISSA McBRIDE: Correct.
6	JED SCHEUERMANN: It's being adopted. It's
7	just not effective.
8	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yeah.
9	JED SCHEUERMANN: It was adopted eons ago.
10	But it's just not been implemented and made effective.
11	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: So, to correct our
12	language, we would say, to take the 2021 adopted code
13	when it goes into effect when you know, when that
14	date is for sure, then you'll write the test to match
15	the code.
16	MELISSA McBRIDE: Correct.
17	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Adopt the code.
18	SETH THOMPSON: So, Chair, if I may.
19	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yes. Yes.
20	SETH THOMPSON: So, I've actually been on the
21	Building Code Council recently.
22	Sorry. This is Seth Thompson.
23	It says March 15th is when it's going to be
24	effective and that it's already been amendments have
25	already been adopted. Because it comes up in a lot for



us in the education side, testing on the '15, adopting the '21, some clarity will be very nice on that.

And obviously this -- I know that the Building

Code Council is the one that adopts the amendments.

And that's -- so I guess this is directed a little
toward Jud since you -- or Jed -- excuse me -- since
you know this. But -- or you might know this.

But has there been any discussion on skipping the '21 code and going to the '24 since the '24 UPC, you know -- we're in 2024 already, right? I know that that has happened before. And I want to say the '03 UPC where it was skipped and went to the '06.

Does anyone know if that's been a discussion topic?

JED SCHEUERMANN: I will answer with Jed Scheuermann's personal opinion on this.

I mean, I go to the State Building Code Council meeting. I rarely miss them.

What the State Building Code Council is going to do is beyond my ability to guess. It is true that they have skipped code cycles before, I believe the 2000 and the 2003.

The 2024 uniform codes are published. They have been published for quite a while already. And by statute this state is mandated to begin to look at the



1 2024 UPCs, which will happen imminently. 2 So, you know, to -- to implement a code for a few months, I don't know what -- I don't know how much 3 sense that makes -- that's my personal opinion --4 because it's conceivable that the 2024s will be adopted 5 6 and the lifespan of the 2021s will be only a few That's conceivable, as I see it. 7 months. CHAIR TODD ALLRED: But based on recent 8 history -- when I say recent history the last 10, 15 9 10 years, 20 years -- what is your anticipation of that 11 actually happening? JED SCHEUERMANN: Of which? 12 13 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Of the State Building 14 Code Council adopting the '24 code in short order. 15 JED SCHEUERMANN: They're under legislative 16 mandate to do it. 17 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: But they've never done it 18 before. JED SCHEUERMANN: Well, they have. But there 19 20 wasn't this -- this other issue about energy --21 different forms of energy and whatnot that was 22 percolating in the background with lawsuits because 23 that -- in essence, that's -- they're waiting to see --

Jed's personal opinion, they're waiting to see if that

Berkeley decision gets overturned or not.

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So they

don't want to pull the pin and implement and make effective the codes. I think some people are still hoping that the Berkeley decisions get overturned.

SETH THOMPSON: Mr. Chair, if I may.

CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yes.

SETH THOMPSON: So, I mean, this is going off memory. But if you look at past adoption of amendments, the '18, '15, '12, '9, they were all adopted within a year of the UPC coming out. So they were relatively on par until '18, '21, '24. And it's especially frustrating when you're talking about continuing education.

I'm on that board that approves continuing education. Get calls all the time, and they're asking, "Should I submit for the '21 code? Should I submit for the '24? We're still testing on the '15. What do I do?" And I don't really have an answer for that, as well.

And I would love to hear, you know -- we definitely need a voice or someone on the Building Code Council, in my opinion, that will help the council understand what that discrepancy or -- lack of a better term.

What we're dealing with right now is very frustrating. And trying to stay with current code but



test on code that's nearly ten years old is extremely frustrating.

And I do think it stems directly from the Building Code Council and their lack to approve the amendments in a timely manner. We're talking about three years after the '21 code came out, and it's now being adopted when the '24 code's out. Just seems silly to me.

And for people running apprenticeship programs, like myself, forcing our apprentices to purchase '21 code books when the '24 are out and we're testing on the '15, that's expensive for them. Doesn't make a lot of sense.

So, it's really hard for me to provide guidance to people on that matter when I don't have an answer for them.

CHAIR TODD ALLRED: This is another reason that it's very important that we get resolved on this and get someone on the State Building Code Council to represent the industry.

SETH THOMPSON: Absolutely.

CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Because I don't think they understand the outcome of their decisions, how it affects people, because it is frustrating.

JED SCHEUERMANN: Excuse me, Chair. I would recommend that anyone and everyone who's in the



1 industry who has the time on Friday should show up at 2 the State Building Code Council and speak in the public-comment period and let your voice be known that 3 you would like to see a plumber on that board and you 4 would like to see decisions made that are timely and, 5 6 you know, effective for the plumbing industry. Come and have your voice heard. 7 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Agreed. 8 9 SCOTT FOWLER: Is it a legislative fix to 10 make sure that's a mandatory? 11 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: That's certainly on my 12 radar. 13 I think there's also -- I think that there's also consideration -- if we're going to go down that road, 14 15 not just as a board but as an industry, I think that we 16 should also probably mandate that the members of the council live in the state of Washington --17 18 BRAD MOORE: I'd agree with that. -- because I believe that 19 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: 20 the --21 I don't know what changes you're referring to, 22 Jed, but I believe the chair of the council lives in 23 California. 24 JED SCHEUERMANN: I'm -- there -- right now, 25 as far as I know, there is no chair. The chair stepped



1	down.
2	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Oh, okay.
3	JED SCHEUERMANN: And but the chair I
4	think it's the managing director that you refer to,
5	perhaps, not the not the council chair. I could be
6	wrong on that. But I think so.
7	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Okay.
8	JED SCHEUERMANN: And I don't know where the
9	managing director lives. I believe he comes from
10	California.
11	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Yeah. I could have
12	errored information, but I don't know for sure.
13	Anyway, I think that
14	Yes, Steve.
15	STEVE NASTRUZ: Steve Nastruz.
16	So, I'm sure the electricians are dealing with the
17	same conundrum as the plumbers. I mean, they've got
18	licensing and code codes that need to be adopted and
19	their training that's affiliated to the adopted code.
20	Or did the SBCC give them a special some kind
21	of special thing and say, "Yeah, go ahead and start on
22	your code cycle"?
23	I think it would probably be beneficial for
24	someone within the plumbers world to meet with the
25	electrician side and say, you know, "Are you dealing



1 with the same thing? Let's" -- "let's team up and have 2 a stronger voice." Just a suggestion. 3 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Guessing from this 4 initial look that I just did, that we're under the 2018 5 6 electrical code, so they're a little bit behind. STEVE NASTRUZ: They haven't moved anywhere 7 either. 8 9 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Anyway . . . Okay. 10 JED SCHEUERMANN: Todd. 11 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Any additional --12 Yes. 13 JED SCHEUERMANN: I hate to keep talking 14 here. 15 But the State Building Code Council has, that I 16 know of, zero to do with electrical. The electrical is a completely separate situation. They're not under the 17 18 State Building Code Council. Structural code, 19 mechanical code, fire code. Electrical code is not part of that world. Plumbing is. But not -- not 20 21 electrical. 22 The electrical -- the electrical situation is 23 different in that they are not under the SBCC. 24 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Really? 25 JED SCHEUERMANN: That is perhaps why they



1	are not fraught with the same issues.
2	BRAD MOORE: They operate individually.
3	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: That's an option, too.
4	BRAD MOORE: Yep. We should operate the
5	exact same way.
6	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Bring it out from under
7	the SBCC.
8	You know, the thing is that makes a lot of
9	sense, Jed, to bring if we were to bring it out and
10	take it away from them because the UPC is the only code
11	they're using that's not part of the international code
12	body. Right?
13	JED SCHEUERMANN: I believe so.
14	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: So, that's a
15	consideration.
16	All right. Everything noted.
17	Any additional comments?
18	(No audible response.)
19	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: All right. We'll move on
20	to the next agenda item.
21	I have no update.
22	Nice, smooth transition, Jed.
23	JED SCHEUERMANN: Okay. This will be
24	positive and upbeat.
25	In the IAPMO world, things are a little quiet



because we've just emerged from the holiday season.

And on the 12th of January we closed our proposal period for the 2027 UPC. So, the next thing on the agenda for the IAPMO is the technical committee meetings on the 6th through the 10th of May, where all the proposals that were made for the 2027 UPC and UMC will be debated and heard.

And then following that, every IAPMO member can have their voice heard at the assembly consideration session on the 24th of September in Las Vegas,

Nevada. That's where all the voting of the IAPMO membership will occur so that your directed voice can be heard with regards to the codes.

If anyone is --

And this is not -- this is a plug for membership, but -- not trying to be a heavy hand or anything like that.

If you want to get involved in the IAPMO process and you're not an IAPMO member, I encourage you to do that sooner rather than later because you need at least six months of active membership before you can vote in the council's and the apprentice- -- the assembly consideration sessions.

Other piece of good news is IAPMO has officially acquired ARCSA. That's the American Rainwater



1 Catchment Systems Association. They are now part of 2 And we are working together very aggressively IAPMO. to increase the scope and the stature of ARCSA in North 3 America and the world. 4 Partnering with ASSE, the 21,000 series of 5 6 personnel qualifications certify individuals as 7 installers, as designers, or as inspectors of rainwater catchment systems. Last month myself and a colleague 8

Compliance 11 supervisor for the south team, he led the south team in all their compliance activities. 12 13 He was part of the FAIR team, which was

legislation from, I think, 2008, (spell), which created the compliance teams that focused on audit and collection. So he's very versed in compliance.

His passion is outreach. He really loves to do education before enforcement. He's very good at that. So, Dale's taken one of those positions doing the audits.

The other's Colter. Colter's been on for -- oh, gosh, time flies -- five months maybe.

You've been on for about a year now, right? And Colter is about five months.

He is going on leave at the end of the month. So,

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currently that will leave Dale the only one performing the audits. So we may be getting a little behind on audits, to no fault of Dale. He works hard every day.

So, we've got those two technical-specialist positions.

One thing I've been talking about -- I have a meeting, I think, on Friday -- is adding a plumbing-contractor course, like Jesse did the construction-contractor training days. I want to look at doing the plumbing-contractor training days, kind of an overview on what the responsibilities and options are out there for plumbing contractors as well as trainees and journey level to go over the requirements, make things easier in front end so we can help get those affidavits approved on a first submittal. So, Dale, I think, will be a prime person providing those training courses.

We have the meeting on Friday. I don't have anything on it yet. So I don't know if you've seen it on your calendar.

Surprise.

So, we're having initial meetings to look at what that can look like to deliver those courses, as well.

I think I've talked about several times in past meetings that we have a responsibility to make sure



1	that we're educating. And we need to give as much as
2	education as we can out there instead of just
3	surprising our plumbers and trainees with denials and
4	other responsibilities that we haven't communicated up
5	on front.
6	So, we're going to I'll have more at the next
7	board meeting to report on that. But that's our goal,
8	is to add some type of educational, free courses to the
9	contractor training days.
10	And then Bruce, who's always attending these
11	meetings, he's ill today. So that is why Bruce is not
12	here, the third technical specialist.
13	I just does that sound like a
14	technical-specialist update? I don't know if this is

Are you going to be teaching this class in person, or you got something else going on?

STEVE NASTRUZ: Yeah, I created a course.

One of the plumbing shops up in Seattle wanted to have



1	me do some CEU classes. I said, "Well, I need to

3	somebody else's, but he wouldn't let me for some you

L7	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: In defense of the
18	Department the Department, which I'm not a part of,
19	I will say, you did you do come from government, so
20	you know the wheels of government turn a little slow.
21	STEVE NASTRUZ: They do. So, you heard the

1 MELISSA McBRIDE: I just appreciate the 2 opportunity to talk. And I'll reiterate, I hear what you're saying, and I know that there's some things that 3 we need to look into. And we'll be doing that. 4 5 STEVE NASTRUZ: Thank you. 6 BRAD MOORE: Is there a basic outline that these guys have already made up if you want to get a 7 class approved? These are the steps you got to go 8 9 These are the things you got cover? through? 10 MELISSA McBRIDE: Yes. 11 That's on our website. Correct? 12 ALISHA HOLMES: Yep. 13 MELISSA McBRIDE: Yeah. I think -- and I 14 think that we are -- for that part, I think that we --15 you know, we outline what's needed and what to do. 16 I think where the work needs to happen there is internal on consistency and communication. 17 So 18 that's -- that's where we need to work for the approval 19 process. STEVE NASTRUZ: Can I add to this 20 21 conversation? 22 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Go ahead, Steve. 23 STEVE NASTRUZ: Well, it was well outlined. 24 But I'd say that the way it's prescribed, it would 25 almost be somebody has to come to Tumwater with your



materials and submit it in. There's not a -- there's not a sound method of sending in electronically. It states in there that, "We don't have the capability to receive this information electronically."

I'm like, "My gosh, you know, in today's world?"
You know, if a guy can't drive across the state, he should be able to submit electronically.

And so, yeah. And then they want everything in quadruple copy. And so, yeah. You have to -- if you have 150-page PowerPoint presentation, that's, you know, 500-and-something pages you got to print of your PowerPoint, which could be, you know -- and I put things on a thumb drive, and apparently they couldn't open the thumb drive, was one of the information I got.

And then you're supposed to submit all the materials you're using. Well, for one main ingredient to the material is the 2021 codebook. So I have to buy four codebooks and turn it -- hand it over to the State?

You know, I -- I put my electronic version on my thumb drive as part of my material course.

So, needs a little more clarification on what they really need to understand what you're using for your CEU course.

MELISSA McBRIDE: Okay.



1	STEVE NASTRUZ: I don't think if you're
2	saying you're doing an update for the 2021 code, you
3	shouldn't have to get four codebooks put in.
4	So, that needs to be a little, you know, looked at
5	and soothed and massaged
6	MELISSA McBRIDE: Okay.
7	STEVE NASTRUZ: to make it a little easier
8	for submissions.
9	SCOTT FOWLER: I'm going to find out 'cause
10	I've been asked to do a bunch of classes for the
11	Groundwater Association.
12	MELISSA McBRIDE: Okay.
13	SCOTT FOWLER: So I'm going to start the
14	processes.
15	MELISSA McBRIDE: Okay.
16	CHAIR TODD ALLRED: Problems we didn't know
17	existed.
18	BRAD MOORE: I've been having some struggles
19	with that, too. We do our monthly IAPMO meeting, and
20	we bring in instructors that already have their course
21	approved. I turn those hours in monthly, and they're
22	not showing up as continuing education. And I thought
23	I had done all the paperwork correctly. But I find it
24	a little could be confusing, as well. I'm not teaching
25	a class myself. But I'm teaching I'm bringing



1 people in that already have approved CEU classes, but 2 those hours are not being -- are not being approved once I turn the hours in. Right? 3 So, the IAPMO -- they -- say someone like Steve comes. He teaches a class for an hour. I put what the 5 6 class is, who was in there, their license numbers, turn in, and then nothing. There's nothing on the --7 STEVE NASTRUZ: But I think the instructor is 8 9 supposed to submit the roster, has to do attendance and 10 everything. So, I don't know. 11 BRAD MOORE: Yeah. It's gone on for years. And then all of a sudden it's not being accepted 12 13 anymore. 14 If I'm doing something wrong, tell me what I'm 15 doing wrong, and I will correct it. 16 MELISSA McBRIDE: Right. 17 BRAD MOORE: But I'm unclear. 18 MELISSA McBRIDE: Okay. 19 BRAD MOORE: Sent a check in for 250 bucks. 20 And I filled out the paperwork. And 12 13 we will work to improve that. 14 BRAD MOORE: Thanks. I appreciate it. 15 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: I just looking real quick 16 on mine 'cause I know I attended one of your IAPMO meetings a couple of months ago. So I'm going to check 17 18 here and see if it shows up on mine. 19 Nope. Not on mine. 20 So, there's -- it's not being approved. Yeah. 21 Any other -- any other new business? 22 Very good. I'll entertain a motion to adjourn. 23 ANTONIO CRUZ: So moved. 24 BRAD MOORE: Second. 25 CHAIR TODD ALLRED: All right. Thank you
