### Employee Killed when Clothing Caught on Power Take-Off Shaft



### What happened?

On February 21, 2008, a 40-year-old orchard laborer was working as part of a two-person team drilling holes for posts to support wires between young apple trees. One employee was on the tractor. The decedent was on the ground behind the tractor, guiding the posthole digger with his arms when his right sleeve became entangled in the power take-off shaft. The shaft was rotating at more than 500 revolutions per minute. The employee's arm was severed. He bled to death at the scene of the accident.

### What can you do to prevent this from happening at your workplace?

- Read and follow the equipment's operator's manual.
- Do not wear loose-fitting clothing when working in a close proximity to rotating or revolving power equipment.
- Ensure that all rotating parts are properly guarded.
- Remove equipment from service when it is not properly guarded.
- Plan and practice emergency procedures.
