



## Hooktender Struck by Rolling Log While Preparing to Set Choker

**Task:** Preparing to set choker **Occupation:** Hooktender **Release Date:** 2023

In May of 2020, a 44-year-old hooktender died after he was struck by a rolling log that then pinned him against another log. The hooktender had worked for his employer, a logging company, for seven years and had worked in the logging industry for 27 years. On the day of the incident, he was working at a cable logging site. The hooktender and the rigging slinger were standing on a side-hill felled log waiting for the carriage to return so they could set chokers. The hooktender jumped down to the downhill side of the log to look for a choker hole. The rigging slinger felt the log begin to move. As he jumped off the log, he yelled a warning to the hooktender below him. Seconds later the log rolled downhill striking the hooktender and pinning him against another log. He died at the scene.

### **Safety Requirements**

- Whenever possible, chokers must be set from the uphill side of the log. Persons must not be on the lower side of a log which appears to be unstable or likely to roll. See <u>WAC 296-54-577(15)</u>
- A safety and health meeting must be held each time you move logging or timber felling operations to a new job site. When moving to new site, site specific hazards should be identified and discussed during the prejob safety meeting. See WAC 296-54-51510(2)

#### **Recommended Safe Practices**

- Ensure that workers:
  - Watch for unstable logs when setting chokers.
