

## 2023 Work-Related Deaths

## Washington State Work-Related Fatalities, 2023

Washington Fatality Assessment and Control Evaluation program (WA FACE)<sup>1</sup>



- 72 workers died on the job, 10 fewer than died in 2022.
- 20 workers died of accidental drug overdoses, the most of any incident type, in 13 industry sectors.
- Motor vehicle incidents (10) and falls (10) were the next most frequent cause of death.
- 12 construction workers died, half of the number (24) who died in 2022.
- There were fewer homicides (8) and suicides (4) than there were in 2022.

## **Fatalities in Previous Years**

| Year | Annual Total |

| 2022 | 82           |
| 2023 | 72           |

- 1. WA FACE collects information on occupational fatalities in WA State. It receives funding from the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH)
- 2. Data are preliminary and are current as of April 8, 2024. Changes to fatality information may occur due to late reports or updates.
- 3. Numbers reflect date of fatal incident.
